- The last time Seattle faced Connecticut on 7/31/15, the Storm finished with three players in double-figures. Sue Bird led the team in scoring with 15 points, Jewell Loyd collected 13 points and Crystal Langhorne added 10.
- With the last Sun victory, Connecticut finished the season sweep of the Storm for the second-straight year.
- Sue Bird scored in double-figures for the second time in her previous seven games last. She finished with 15 points to move her to within six points of 5,000, which she has since surpassed.
- Seattle's first championship (2004) came by defeating Connecticut in the WNBA Finals, 2-1.

2015 RESULTS VS. CONNECTICUT

Seattle 58, Connecticut 79 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (6/16/15)

Trailing at halftime, the Storm made a push to get back into the game and cut the deficit to six but Connecticut went on a strong run to put the game out of reach as Seattle fell 79-58 on Tuesday night. With the Storm trailing by 11 at the half, it was sharp early in the second half and put together 6-2 run, capped by an Alysha Clark basket and free throw, to cut the Connecticut lead to seven. She finished with 11 points on 4-for-6 from the field. Sue Bird hit a layup to make it a six-point game but Connecticut pushed back much like it did in the first half with a 9-0 run with five from Alex Bentley to take a 55-40 advantage. Seattle committed 22 turnovers and Connecticut took advantage with 32 points off the Storm miscues. Connecticut had four players score in double figures, led by Chelsea Gray a career-high with 16 points. The Storm defense did its part to keep the team in it with six blocks, six steals and held Connecticut to 43.1 percent shooting. The Storm will get a few days of rest before returning to action on Sunday against defending WNBA champion Phoenix. Seattle played suffocating defense to begin the game and held Connecticut scoreless for the first 3:05 and all the while the Storm's ball movement resulted in five baskets in the lane as they took an early 10-5 lead. The Storm had five assists on their first six buckets. With Seattle up 22-17 early in the second quarter, Connecticut got five points from Chelsea Gray during a 9-0 run to put the Sun up by four. Connecticut ended the half on a 24-8 run and were led by Little, who finished with half with 10 points. Crystal Langhorne scored all of her team-high 13 points in the first half.

Seattle 66, Connecticut 67 - Mohegan Sun Arena, Uncasville, CT. (7/31/2015)

After strong run in the fourth quarter to take the lead, the Storm watched Connecticut rally back behind former Storm guard Shekinna Stricklen as she scored the final five points in the 67-66 loss on Friday night. Seattle 82, Washington 84 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (5/26/16)

After erasing a 16-point deficit in the second half to force overtime, the Seattle Storm lost 84-82 to the Washington Mystics at KeyArena. Storm rookie forward Breanna Stewart scored a game and career-high 25 points to go along with seven rebounds, four blocks and four steals. Trailing by 16 with 3:24 to go in the third quarter, Seattle (1-3) marched back into the game behind Stewart and point guard Sue Bird, who notched 11 of her 15 points and four of her five assists in the second half. Bird found Jewell Loyd under the hoop for the game-tying layup with seven seconds to go that sent it to overtime. In the overtime period, Mystics guard Ivory Latta hit a corner three-pointer with 44 seconds remaining to give Washington a four-point lead. Stewart made a three-pointer of her own to make it 83-82 in the final seconds, but the Storm wasn't able to complete another comeback. Stewart shot 10-of-20 from the floor on her way to 25 points, which marks a season high for the No. 1 pick in the 2016 WNBA Draft. Alysha Clark scored 10 points and Crystal Langhorne added 10 against her former team, making it the third straight contest in which four Seattle players reached double figures. Washington initially built its lead through a 12-0 run spanning the end of the first quarter and the beginning of the second, and it held a 40-33 edge at the break. Before the Storm made its run to send the game to overtime, the Mystics used an 11-2 run to increase their lead to 16 late in the third quarter. In her season debut, Latta scored 16 off the bench for the Mystics, who improve to 2-3 with Thursday's victory. Emma Meesseman notched a team-high 19 points, and Tayler Hill added 18 to give Washington its first win at KeyArena since 2005. Storm forward Jenna O'Hea made her season debut Thursday night after missing the first three games. She scored six points in 14 minutes of action, including a three-pointer the first time she touched the ball. O'Hea was unavailable for the season opener and rested the previous two games due to concluding overseas commitments.

Seattle 71, Minnesota 78 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (5/22/16)

Despite a career-high 20 points from forward Alysha Clark, the Seattle Storm fell 78-71 to the defending WNBA champion Minnesota Lynx in front of 9,686 fans at KeyArena in its home opener on Sunday. Coming off its first victory of the season on Friday, the Storm (1-2) started with a stellar first quarter on Sunday, outscoring Minnesota 24-19 with rookie forward Breanna Stewart leading the way with nine points. After scoring four points combined in the first two games, Clark had seven in the first quarter and would go on to pass her previous career high of 14 early in the fourth quarter. The Lynx (3-0) went on a 9-0 run early in the second quarter behind former MVP Maya Moore, who didn't take a shot in the first quarter but exploded for 10 in the second. Moore scored seven points in a two-minute span to help Minnesota build a narrow lead that it would hold onto for the rest of the night. Moore, who entered Sunday's game at second in the WNBA in points per game behind Seattle's Jewell Loyd, finished with a team-high 17 points on 7-of-15 field goals. Stewart finished with 14 points and a game-high 13 rebounds, while Loyd added 14 points and Sue Bird notched 12 points with nine assists. Sunday's game marked the second straight contest that four Seattle players reached double figures. It was a very slow start to the second half for both teams, as Seattle and Minnesota combined for just 18 points in the third quarter. The Lynx led 54-51 heading into the final period, and point guard Lindsay Whalen led the way in the fourth quarter with seven points to help Minnesota hold on for its third straight victory to start the season. The Lynx were held to by far their lowest scoring output of the season, as they had put up 97 and 95 points in their first two games.

Jewell Loyd scored a career-high 30 points on 12-of-20 shooting against Phoenix on May 20, including the game-winning jump shot with 2.9 seconds remaining. Loyd, who won Rookie of the Year last season, made more three-pointers in that contest (three) than she did in any game her first year. Before her game-winner in the final seconds, she also hit a crucial jumper with 41.9 seconds left to bring the Storm with-in one. Loyd scored the final 10 points for Seattle, finishing the fourth quarter with 12 on 6-of-7 field goals. She became just the sixth player in franchise history to score 30 points.

IT'S RAINING IN SEATTLE

In 2015, 23.8 percent of the shots Seattle took were three-pointers, one of the highest marks in the WNBA. That percentage was even higher during the previous five seasons, when the Storm was always either first or second in the category. This year could be similar, as 10 of the 12 players on Seattle's roster have proven to be threats from three-point range. Through four games of the 2016 season, 72 of the 250 (28.8 percent) of Seattle's shots have been three-pointers. The Storm ranks fourth in the league with 17.7 attempted per game, and fifth with a 31.9 percent conversion rate.

20+ CLUB

In the season opener against Los Angeles, Seattle had two players score 20-plus points: Reigning Rookie of the Year Jewell Loyd had 20 on 6-of-14 shooting, while 2016 No. 1 draft pick Breanna Stewart notched a team-high 23 points on 9-of-13 from the field. Only once in 2015 did the Storm have two players score at least 20 points. With Loyd notching a career-high 30 points against Phoenix and Alysha Clark scoring a career-high 20 vs. Minnesota, Seattle has had three different 20-point scorers and three different leading scorers in four games. Thursday's game against Washington marked the third straight contest that four Storm players reached double figures.

AMONG LEAGUE LEADERS

Four games into the season, Seattle has several players among the WNBA leaders in the main offensive categories. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart is fourth in the league with 9.8 rebounds per game. Sue Bird is tied for sixth with 4.8 assists per game, while Stewart ranks sixth with 19 points per contest and Jewell Loyd ranks eighth with 18.3 points per game. Stewart and Loyd are first and second in the league in minutes per game with averages of 36.5 and 35.8, respectively. Here is where Stewart ranks among rookies: first in points (19.0), first in rebounds (9.8), third in assists (2.8), first in steals (2.0) and first in blocks (1.8).

POPPIN' CHAMPAGNE IN FRANCE

On the same day her Seattle team opened the WNBA season, Storm forward Jenna O'Hea captured a championship with French club Lattes Montpiellar. O'Hea's team won 65-63 this past Sunday to take the series-clinching game three. On their way to the title, Lattes Montpiellar won in the semifinal round over Charleville-Mezieres, which features fellow Storm forward Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis. O'Hea, who also won the French Cup the previous year, averaged just under 10 points off the bench for Lattes Montpiellar in 2016. O'Hea made her WNBA season debut on Thursday against Washington after missing the first three games, scoring six points in 14 minutes of action off the bench.

A STORM CHAMPION RETURNS

On Saturday against the Connecticut Sun, Seattle welcomes back two former Storm players who now come off the bench for the Sun. Shekinna Stricklen played three seasons in Seattle (2012-14), appearing in 101 games and starting 34. Camille Little spent seven successful seasons with the Storm (2008-14), which included the 2010 WNBA championship. As a starter in Seattle's frontcourt, Little averaged 14 points and a team-high nine rebounds per game in the 2010 WNBA Finals. Last season for the Sun, Little started all 34 games and averaged 8.2 points.

NO LONGER UNDER THE (STORM) RADAR

In a game full of superstars – six United States Olympians and six No. 1 draft picks were on the court when the Storm hosted Minnesota last Sunday – it was Alysha Clark who shined the brightest. After totaling four points in the first two games, the fifth-year forward scored seven in the first quarter en route to a career-high 20 on 7-of-13 shooting. Clark had also scored 20 in a preseason game. On the other end of the court, Clark spent most of the night defending one of the best players in the league (Maya Moore) and held her to a season-low 17 points.

SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 15th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is ninth in career steals with 549. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 13 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 549 career steals rank fifth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up two spots on the all-time list this year.

THIRD QUARTER BLUES

In back-to-back games, both the Storm and its opponent started cold from the field in the third quarter. Against Minnesota and Washington, the Storm and its foe made just one field goal apiece in the first five minutes of the second half. Seattle has shot a combined 25 percent (9-of-36) in the third quarter of its last two games. The Storm averaged 13 points in those third quarters, while its two opponents averaged 14.5. Against Washington, Seattle trailed by 16 with 3:24 to go in the third quarter and marched back to send the game into overtime.

TEAM NOTES

#ROADTORIO

On Wednesday, April 27, the USA Women's Basketball Team 12-athlete roster for the 2016 Olympics was named. Sue Bird was named to her fourth Olympic team, going for her fourth Gold medal. Storm rookie Breanna Stewart was also named to the team. This is the first time in Storm history that the active roster had two members on an Olympic roster. Stewart and Bird won a gold medal together at the 2014 FIBA World Championships.

TAK-ING THE WNBA BY STORM

Seattle's Jewell Loyd won Rookie of the Year in 2015, but teammate Ramu Tokashiki wasn't too far behind her in terms of statistical dominance compared to other first-year players. Tokashiki was third among rookies in points (8.3 per game), third in blocks (0.9), fourth in minutes (20.6) and second in free throw shooting behind Loyd (86.2 percent). She ranked in the top 20 of the entire WNBA in free throw shooting and overall plus-minus rating. Tokashiki played in 30 games for the Storm, leading the team in scoring four times and posting a team high in blocks 17 times.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

Seattle owned the No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft for the second straight year, the second time a WNBA team has selected first back-to-back years. After doing so in 2001 and 2002, the Storm won its first WNBA title within three seasons. Including Lauren Jackson and Sue Bird, seven of the players taken No. 1 overall in the WNBA Draft between 2001 and 2013 have won at least one title. In the NBA, having back-to-back top picks has proven to deliver even quicker success: All three times NBA franchises have chosen first overall in consecutive years since 1965, they have made the NBA finals within two seasons (Orlando Magic 1992-93, Houston Rockets 1983-84, Cleveland Cavaliers 2013-14).

STEWART'S STORM

During a historic, unprecedented career at Connecticut, Breanna Stewart won four consecutive national championships and guided the Huskies to a pair of perfect seasons (2013-14 and 2015-16). She was named Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four in all four of her team's title runs and won AP Player of the Year three straight seasons. A four-year starter at Connecticut, Stewart becomes the fifth Husky to be selected with the top pick in the WNBA draft. She finished her college career with a 151-5 record after leading the Huskies in scoring for the past three seasons. During her senior year, Stewart averaged 19.4 points, 8.7 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.4 blocks per game while shooting 57.9 percent from the field and 42.6 percent from the 3-point line. Stewart is the only player in Division I women's basketball history to record 300 blocks and 300 assists in her career. At the 2013 Final Four, she became the first freshman in 26 years to earn the tournament's Most Outstanding Player award. Stewart has also played for the United States National Team, helping the USA win gold at the 2014 FIBA World Championship.

THE GHOSTS' OF UCONN'S PAST

In her most recent game against the Mystics, Storm rookie Breanna Stewart battled two former University of Connecticut teammates in Stefanie Dolson and Bria Hartley. Stewart has faced at least one UConn player in every game other than the season opener against Los Angeles, and twice she's matched up with multiple former Huskies. Saturday's game against the Sun will feature another pair of former UConn stars, including rookie Morgan Tuck, who won four consecutive national titles with Stewart. Stewart, Tuck and Moriah Jefferson (San Antonio) became the first trio of college teammates to be selected with the top three picks in the WNBA Draft.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 365 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. The 2015 season saw Bird fall just .4 assists per game short of leading the league in the category (Courtney Vandersloot, 5.8 apg, 2015).

BOUCEK BACK FOR YEAR 2

Now in her fifth season as a WNBA head coach and second with the Seattle Storm, Jenny Boucek is tasked with guiding the Storm back to the playoffs for the first time since 2013. The club was 10-24 this past season, finishing four games out of the playoff race. Prior to taking over as head coach in Seattle last year, Boucek held the same role for the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs from 2007-09. She was an assistant coach in Seattle from 2003-05 and 2010-14 – Boucek was around for both of the team's WNBA titles – before being promoted to head coach. The Storm made improvements in a few different areas after Boucek took over, namely on the defensive end. Seattle's opponents scored just 7.1 fast break points per game last season, good for second in the WNBA. The Storm also allowed just 30.5 points in the paint on average, the fourth best mark in the league.

JENNY BOUCEK

On January 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was announced as the head coach of the Seattle Storm, the fourth head coach in the history of the franchise.

Boucek spent four seasons with the Storm under the leadership of Agler, rejoining the Storm in 2010 as the Director of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach prior to the start of the 2014 season.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since its inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-America team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
