Seattle 74, Washington 87 - Verizon Center, Washington DC (7/129/15)

The Storm lost to Washington 87-74. The Storm fell behind by 20 after the first and slowly began to chip away. Seattle tried to keep it close in the second, where Crystal Langhorne scored seven of her nine first half points. A pair of free throws from Markeisha Gatling at the end of the half cut the lead down to 16. The Seattle defense stepped up and held the Mystics to 38.1 percent from the field in the second. Seattle came out in the third and quickly made a game of it. Tokashiki drove to the basket and connected on the scooping layup to cut the lead to 16 and then hit a running bank shot to make it 55-41. Following a Washington timeout, Alysha Clark found Sue Bird on the left wing for the three and the Storm were within 11. The Mystics responded with a 10-1 run to push the advantage back to 20 and went back up by as much as 24. But the Storm had one final push in the fourth and rode Abby Bishop and Quantira Hollingsworth for a 12-0 run to cut the Washington lead to nine. Bishop finished one point short of tying her career-high with 17 on 6-for-12 from the field. Ramu Tokashiki hit a jumper from the baseline to cut the Washington lead to 12-8 in the first. That is when the Mystics bench made its presence known. After five straight points from Stephanie Dolson, Ivory Latta hit a three to bump the Washington lead to 20-8. She hit a pair of free throws on the next possession and then buried another trey to go up by 17. Latta had eight points of the 17 points that came from Washington's bench in the first and 11 in the half off the bench.

Seattle 69, Washington 59 - KeyArena, Seattle, WA. (8/30/15)

Seattle 71, Minnesota 78 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (5/22/16)

Despite a career-high 20 points from forward Alysha Clark, the Seattle Storm fell 78-71 to the defending WNBA champion Minnesota Lynx in front of 9,686 fans at KeyArena in its home opener on Sunday. Coming off its first victory of the season on Friday, the Storm (1-2) started with a stellar first quarter on Sunday, outscoring Minnesota 24-19 with rookie forward Breanna Stewart leading the way with nine points. After scoring four points combined in the first two games, Clark had seven in the first quarter and would go on to pass her previous career high of 14 early in the fourth quarter. The Lynx (3-0) went on a 9-0 run early in the second quarter behind former MVP Maya Moore, who didn't take a shot in the first quarter but exploded for 10 in the second. Moore scored seven points in a two-minute span to help Minnesota build a narrow lead that it would hold onto for the rest of the night. Moore, who entered Sunday's game at second in the WNBA in points per game behind Seattle's Jewell Loyd, finished with a team-high 17 points on 7-of-15 field goals. Stewart finished with 14 points and a game-high 13 rebounds, while Loyd added 14 points and Sue Bird notched 12 points with nine assists. Sunday's game marked the second straight contest that four Seattle players reached double figures. It was a very slow start to the second half for both teams, as Seattle and Minnesota combined for just 18 points in the third quarter. The Lynx led 54-51 heading into the final period, and point guard Lindsay Whalen led the way in the fourth quarter with seven points to help Minnesota hold on for its third straight victory to start the season. The Lynx were held to by far their lowest scoring output of the season, as they had put up 97 and 95 points in their first two games.

Seattle 81, Phoenix 80 - Talking Stick Resort Arena, Phoenix, Ariz. (5/20/16)

Jewell Loyd scored a career-high 30 points, including the game-winning shot with 2.9 seconds remaining, to give the Seattle Storm an 81-80 win over the Phoenix Mercury at Talking Stick Resort Arena on Friday night. Loyd, the reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year, scored 12 of her 30 points in the fourth quarter as the Storm (1-1) picked up its first win of the 2016 season. With Seattle trailing by one in the final seconds, Loyd dribbled from the top of the key toward the right wing, banking in a shot before Phoenix called timeout to set up an attempt of its own. Diana Taurasi was unable to convert on the other end, and the Storm secured its first win over the Mercury since 2013, snapping a nine-game losing streak against its Western Conference foe. Loyd, who finished 12-of-20 from the field, became the sixth player in franchise history to score 30 points in a game. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart recorded her first career double-double with 14 points and 13 rebounds, tying Lauren Jackson for the most rebounds by a Seattle rookie. Sue Bird added 17 points, including 4-of-7 from three-point range, to go along with four assists in Friday's victory. The Storm got off to a slow start on Friday, trailing by as many as 13 in the first quarter and finishing with just 12 points in the period. Seattle outscored Phoenix in each of the remaining three quarters, thanks in large part to nine converted three-point attempts. After making just one shot from beyond the arc in its season-opening loss, the Storm made eight three-pointers in the first half on Friday, including seven in the second quarter. At halftime, Bird was 4-of-6 from deep and Loyd was 3-of-4.

TEAM NOTES

JEWELL'S A GEM

Jewell Loyd scored a career-high 30 points on 12-of-20 shooting against Phoenix on May 20, including the game-winning jump shot with 2.9 seconds remaining. Loyd, who won Rookie of the Year last season, made more three-pointers in that contest (three) than she did in any game her first year. Before her game-winner in the final seconds, she also hit a crucial jumper with 41.9 seconds left to bring the Storm with-in one. Loyd scored the final 10 points for Seattle, finishing the fourth quarter with 12 on 6-of-7 field goals. She became just the sixth player in franchise history to score 30 points.

IT'S RAINING IN SEATTLE

In 2015, 23.8 percent of the shots Seattle took were three-pointers, one of the highest marks in the WNBA. That percentage was even higher during the previous five seasons, when the Storm was always either first or second in the category. This year could be similar, as 10 of the 12 players on Seattle's roster have proven to be threats from three-point range. Through three games of the 2016 season, 53 of the 180 (29.4 percent) of Seattle's shots have been three-pointers. The Storm ranks fourth in the league with 17.7 attempted per game, and eighth with a 30.2 percent conversion rate.

20+ CLUB

In the season opener against Los Angeles, Seattle had two players score 20-plus points: Reigning Rookie of the Year Jewell Loyd had 20 on 6-of-14 shooting, while 2016 No. 1 draft pick Breanna Stewart notched a team-high 23 points on 9-of-13 from the field. Only once in 2015 did the Storm have two players score at least 20 points. With Loyd notching a career-high 30 points against Phoenix and Alysha Clark scoring a career-high 20 vs. Minnesota, Seattle has had three different 20-point scorers and three different leading scorers in three games. Sunday's game against the Lynx marked the second straight contest that four Storm players reached double figures.

AMONG LEAGUE LEADERS

Three games into the season, Seattle has several players among the WNBA leaders in the main offensive categories. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart is fourth in the league with 10.7 rebounds per game, as she is also averaging a double-double with 17 points per game. Sue Bird is tied for seventh in the league with 4.7 assists per game, while Jewell Loyd ranks fifth with 21.3 points per contest. Loyd and Stewart are second and fourth in the league in minutes per game with averages of 35.3 and 35.0, respectively. Here is where Stewart ranks among rookies: first in points (17), first in rebounds (10.7), third in assists (2.7), fourth in steals (1.3) and second in blocks (1.0).

POPPIN' CHAMPAGNE IN FRANCE

On the same day her Seattle team opened the WNBA season, Storm forward Jenna O'Hea captured a championship with French club Lattes Montpiellar. O'Hea's team won 65-63 this past Sunday to take the series-clinching game three. On their way to the title, Lattes Montpiellar won in the semifinal round over Charleville-Mezieres, which features fellow Storm forward Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis. O'Hea, who also won the French Cup the previous year, averaged just under 10 points off the bench for Lattes Montpiellar in 2016. Last season, her first with the Storm, she was one of three Seattle players that appeared in all 34 WNBA games.

JUST THE BEGINNING...

Breanna Stewart put up an impressive stat line in her WNBA debut: a team-high 23 points on 9-of-13 shooting, six rebounds, three assists and two steals. Her 23 points represented the sixth highest total by any player in the league on opening weekend. Compared to other rookies, Stewart ranked first in points, tied for fourth with six rebounds and tied for second with three assists. After Jewell Loyd was the only 2015 rookie in the top five in points, rebounds and assists, Stewart could be in line to do the same this season. In her final season at the University of Connecticut, Stewart led her team in points, rebounds and blocked shots while ranking second in assists.

NO LONGER UNDER THE (STORM) RADAR

In a game full of superstars – six United States Olympians and six No. 1 draft picks were on the court when the Storm hosted Minnesota last Sunday – it was Alysha Clark who shined the brightest. After totaling four points in the first two games, the fifth-year forward scored seven in the first quarter en route to a career-high 20 on 7-of-13 shooting. Clark had also scored 20 in a preseason game. On the other end of the court, Clark spent most of the night defending one of the best players in the league (Maya Moore) and held her to a season-low 17 points.

SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 15th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is ninth in career steals with 549. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 13 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 549 career steals rank fifth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up two spots on the all-time list this year.

HOME SWEET HOME

Born in Spokane and a native of Clarkston, Wash., Jamie Weisner is the newest member of the Washington Mystics and will play her first game with the team against Seattle on Thursday. Weisner was drafted by Connecticut but released before the start of the season. A product of Oregon State, Weisner shared this year's media version of Pac-12 Player of the Year after averaging 17.3 points per game for the conference champion Beavers. She was one of the nation's best three-point shooters at 44.3 percent, and her career three-point shooting percentage of .411 is a program record. Weisner finished sixth all-time in points (1,771) and eighth in rebounds (719) in program history after leading Oregon State to its first Final Four as a senior.

TEAM NOTES

#ROADTORIO

On Wednesday, April 27, the USA Women's Basketball Team 12-athlete roster for the 2016 Olympics was named. Sue Bird was named to her fourth Olympic team, going for her fourth Gold medal. Storm rookie Breanna Stewart was also named to the team. This is the first time in Storm history that the active roster had two members on an Olympic roster. Additionally, with the Minnesota Lynx roster including four Olympians (L. Whalen, S. Augustus, S. Fowles, M. Moore), Seattle's Opening Night game will feature half (6) of the 2016 USA Women's Basketball Olympic roster.

TAK-ING THE WNBA BY STORM

Seattle's Jewell Loyd won Rookie of the Year in 2015, but teammate Ramu Tokashiki wasn't too far behind her in terms of statistical dominance compared to other first-year players. Tokashiki was third among rookies in points (8.3 per game), third in blocks (0.9), fourth in minutes (20.6) and second in free throw shooting behind Loyd (86.2 percent). She ranked in the top 20 of the entire WNBA in free throw shooting and overall plus-minus rating. Tokashiki played in 30 games for the Storm, leading the team in scoring four times and posting a team high in blocks 17 times.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

Seattle owned the No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft for the second straight year, the second time a WNBA team has selected first back-to-back years. After doing so in 2001 and 2002, the Storm won its first WNBA title within three seasons. Including Lauren Jackson and Sue Bird, seven of the players taken No. 1 overall in the WNBA Draft between 2001 and 2013 have won at least one title. In the NBA, having back-to-back top picks has proven to deliver even quicker success: All three times NBA franchises have chosen first overall in consecutive years since 1965, they have made the NBA finals within two seasons (Orlando Magic 1992-93, Houston Rockets 1983-84, Cleveland Cavaliers 2013-14).

STEWART'S STORM

During a historic, unprecedented career at Connecticut, Breanna Stewart won four consecutive national championships and guided the Huskies to a pair of perfect seasons (2013-14 and 2015-16). She was named Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four in all four of her team's title runs and won AP Player of the Year three straight seasons. A four-year starter at Connecticut, Stewart becomes the fifth Husky to be selected with the top pick in the WNBA draft. She finished her college career with a 151-5 record after leading the Huskies in scoring for the past three seasons. During her senior year, Stewart averaged 19.4 points, 8.7 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.4 blocks per game while shooting 57.9 percent from the field and 42.6 percent from the 3-point line. Stewart is the only player in Division I women's basketball history to record 300 blocks and 300 assists in her career. At the 2013 Final Four, she became the first freshman in 26 years to earn the tournament's Most Outstanding Player award. Stewart has also played for the United States National Team, helping the USA win gold at the 2014 FIBA World Championship.

ROOKIE OF THE YEAR RETURNS FOR SOPHOMORE SEASON

Following a season where she led all rookies in scoring percentage (10.7), and was the only rookie ranking in the top five in points, rebounds and assists averages, Jewell Loyd, the 2015 WNBA Rookie of the Year, returns to Seattle for her second season. Loyd's rookie season featured a pair of 21-point outbursts (6/28/15 @ Tulsa, 9/6/15 @ Chicago), 17 ten-plus point scoring efforts and she led the team in scoring 10 times. She went 14-of-14 from the free-throw line on 8/30/15 vs. Washington, snapping Lauren Jackson's record of 13-of-13, the most made free-throws without a miss in Storm history.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 370 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.2 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. The 2015 season saw Bird fall just .4 assists per game short of leading the league in the category (Courtney Vandersloot, 5.8 apg, 2015).

BOUCEK BACK FOR YEAR 2

Now in her fifth season as a WNBA head coach and second with the Seattle Storm, Jenny Boucek is tasked with guiding the Storm back to the playoffs for the first time since 2013. The club was 10-24 this past season, finishing four games out of the playoff race. Prior to taking over as head coach in Seattle last year, Boucek held the same role for the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs from 2007-09. She was an assistant coach in Seattle from 2003-05 and 2010-14 – Boucek was around for both of the team's WNBA titles – before being promoted to head coach. The Storm made improvements in a few different areas after Boucek took over, namely on the defensive end. Seattle's opponents scored just 7.1 fast break points per game last season, good for second in the WNBA. The Storm also allowed just 30.5 points in the paint on average, the fourth best mark in the league.

JENNY BOUCEK BIOGRAPHY

JENNY BOUCEK

On January 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was announced as the head coach of the Seattle Storm, the fourth head coach in the history of the franchise.

Boucek spent four seasons with the Storm under the leadership of Agler, rejoining the Storm in 2010 as the Director of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach prior to the start of the 2014 season.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since its inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-America team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
