SERIES NOTES

- Seattle has not won in Indiana in 7 seasons. The last time Seattle won in Indiana was on 7/18/08, toppling the Fever 65-59.
- Today's meeting marks the 22nd meeting between Sue Bird and Tamika Catchings, the longest-active duo in league history to play for the team that drafted them. Bird is 9-12 all-time vs. Catchings, with averages of 12.1 ppg, and 5.0 apg.
- In the teams' last meeting on 8/21/15, Seattle shot a blistering 68.0 percent from the floor in the first half. Indiana outscored Seattle 30-9 during the third quarter, going 9-for-17 from the field, compared to Seattle's 3-for-15 en route to the 63-75 win over the Storm.

2015 RESULTS VS. INDIANA

Seattle 65, Indiana 88 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse, Indianapolis, Ind. (7/8/15)

The Storm struggled to take care of the ball and Indiana took full advantage as the Storm dropped the finale of its three-game road trip 88-65 on Wednesday afternoon. The Storm fell behind early 17-6 in the first quarter with nine points coming from Indiana's Marissa Coleman but then the Storm battled back. On the next possession, Abby Bishop hit a three to bring the deficit to single digits at 17-9. Next time down the floor, Alysha Clark found Jewell Loyd for the alley-oop layup to cut it to eight. Sue Bird chipped in with a pair of free throws and it got the Storm back into the game at 19-13. Bishop finished with 12 points on 4-for-5 shooting. The Storm found itself down by 12 in the second but, again, chipped away at the lead. Clark had five straight points, including a three, and Bird hit a pair of free throws to make it a 36-29 game. But then the turnovers began to pile up for Seattle and Indiana took advantage. The Fever went on a 9-2 run to take a 46-31 lead. Indiana scored 19 points off the 12 Seattle turnovers in the first half. The Fever went into the half with a 53-35 lead. Loyd tried to keep the Storm in the ballgame and attacked the rim as she scored nine points in the period, which included going 4-for-4 from the line. She finished with a team-high 15 points on 3-for-7 from the field and 8-for-10 from the line. It was the fourth time in the last five games Loyd has reached double figures in scoring. Despite Loyd's burst in the quarter, the Storm had no answer on defense as Indiana shot 50 percent from the field and grabbed 13 offensive rebounds.

Seattle 63, Indiana 75 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (8/21/2015)

The Storm shot a blistering 68 percent in the first half and went into the break with a lead but a cool down in the third set the pace for the end of the game as Indiana went on to pick up the 75-63 win on Friday night. The Storm took a six-point lead into the locker room at half but Indiana turned the game around in the third. Seattle attacked the basket in the first half, resulting in 26 points in the paint, but Indiana clogged the paint and forced the Storm outside and slowed its pace. The Storm shot 3-for-15 in the quarter and watch Indiana attack the hoop to shoot 53 percent from the field and go 9-for-9 from the line. Indiana took a 67-52 lead after the third. The Storm, which had outrebounded the Fever 17-9 in the first half, were beat to the glass and Indiana grabbed 12 rebounds to Seattle's four. Briann January scored seven of her nine in the third. The Storm will get a full week off before hitting the court again when it takes on San Antonio on Aug. 28. Seattle and Indiana battled back and forth early into the second quarter but then the Storm began to pull away. With the Fever leading 29-28, Loyd went on the attack and used a crossover to get into the lane and banked one in off glass to give the Storm a one-point lead. LAST GAME

Seattle 93, Connecticut 81 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (5/28/16)

Jewell Loyd scored a game-high 26 points, including 18 in the second half, to guide the Seattle Storm to a 93-81 win over the Connecticut Sun on Saturday at KeyArena. Crystal Langhorne shot 8-for-8 from the field on her way to a season-high 18 points as the Storm (2-3) picked up its first home victory of the season. Seattle had its best offensive performance of the year on Saturday, setting season highs in points, field goal percentage (56.1 percent), assists (16) and free throws (23). All five Storm starters reached double figures, as Sue Bird added 18 while Breanna Stewart and Alysha Clark each scored 11. Both teams began Saturday's game with hot shooting, with the Storm starting 8-of-10 from the field led by eight quick points from Langhorne. Seattle made 11 of its 17 field goal attempts in the opening period, while the Sun shot 52.9 percent in the first quarter. The Storm held a 28-20 edge after one period. In the second quarter, the Storm led by as many as 12 and held an 11-point edge with 2:26 remaining. But turnovers plagued Seattle late in the half – the Storm committed nine total turnovers in the second quarter – allowing Connecticut to cut into its deficit and pull within two by halftime. The Storm held a 39-37 edge at the break behind 10 points from Langhorne after it scored just two points in the final five minutes of the half. The Storm started with a turnover on its first possession of the second half, but proceeded to blitz the Sun with a 21-2 run behind a trio of Loyd jump shots to open up a 60-41 lead midway through the third quarter. Saturday's third quarter was the opposite of the previous two games for Seattle. It had averaged 13 points on 25 percent shooting in its last two third quarters, but exploded for 31 points on 9-of-13 from the field against the Sun. In the final minutes of the fourth quarter, Langhorne and Clark each made crucial three-pointers to prevent Connecticut from making a comeback. For Langhorne, the three-pointer was the final shot of her perfect night and her first basket from beyond the arc since 2014. The veteran forward had made six career three-pointers prior to Saturday.

PREVIOUS GAME

Seattle 82, Washington 84 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (5/26/16)

After erasing a 16-point deficit in the second half to force overtime, the Seattle Storm lost 84-82 to the Washington Mystics at KeyArena. Storm rookie forward Breanna Stewart scored a game and career-high 25 points to go along with seven rebounds, four blocks and four steals. Trailing by 16 with 3:24 to go in the third quarter, Seattle (1-3) marched back into the game behind Stewart and point guard Sue Bird, who notched 11 of her 15 points and four of her five assists in the second half. Bird found Jewell Loyd under the hoop for the game-tying layup with seven seconds to go that sent it to overtime. In the overtime period, Mystics guard Ivory Latta hit a corner three-pointer with 44 seconds remaining to give Washington a four-point lead. Stewart made a three-pointer of her own to make it 83-82 in the final seconds, but the Storm wasn't able to complete another comeback. Stewart shot 10-of-20 from the floor on her way to 25 points, which marks a season high for the No. 1 pick in the 2016 WNBA Draft. Alysha Clark scored 10 points and Crystal Langhorne added 10 against her former team, making it the third straight contest in which four Seattle players reached double figures. Washington initially built its lead through a 12-0 run spanning the end of the first quarter and the beginning of the second, and it held a 40-33 edge at the break. Before the Storm made its run to send the game to overtime, the Mystics used an 11-2 run to increase their lead to 16 late in the third quarter. In her season debut, Latta scored 16 off the bench for the Mystics, who improve to 2-3 with Thursday's victory. Emma Meesseman notched a team-high 19 points, and Tayler Hill added 18 to give Washington its first win at KeyArena since 2005. Storm forward Jenna O'Hea made her season debut Thursday night after missing the first three games. She scored six points in 14 minutes of action, including a three-pointer the first time she touched the ball. O'Hea was unavailable for the season opener and rested the previous two games due to concluding overseas commitments.

TEAM NOTES

JEWELL'S A GEM

Jewell Loyd scored a career-high 30 points on 12-of-20 shooting against Phoenix on May 20, including the game-winning jump shot with 2.9 seconds remaining. Loyd, who won Rookie of the Year last season, made more three-pointers in that contest (three) than she did in any game her first year. Before her game-winner in the final seconds, she also hit a crucial jumper with 41.9 seconds left to bring the Storm with-in one. Loyd scored the final 10 points for Seattle, finishing the fourth quarter with 12 on 6-of-7 field goals. She became just the sixth player in franchise history to score 30 points.

IT'S RAINING IN SEATTLE

In 2015, 23.8 percent of the shots Seattle took were three-pointers, one of the highest marks in the WNBA. That percentage was even higher during the previous five seasons, when the Storm was always either first or second in the category. This year could be similar, as 10 of the 12 players on Seattle's roster have proven to be threats from three-point range. Through five games of the 2016 season, 90 of the 307 (29.3 percent) of Seattle's shots have been three-pointers. The Storm ranks fourth in the league with 18.0 attempted per game, and fourth with a 32.2 percent conversion rate.

20+ CLUB

In the season opener against Los Angeles, Seattle had two players score 20-plus points: Reigning Rookie of the Year Jewell Loyd had 20 on 6-of-14 shooting, while 2016 No. 1 draft pick Breanna Stewart notched a team-high 23 points on 9-of-13 from the field. Only once in 2015 did the Storm have two players score at least 20 points. With Loyd notching a career-high 30 points against Phoenix and Alysha Clark scoring a career-high 20 vs. Minnesota, Seattle has had three different 20-point scorers and three different leading scorers in five games, and Sue Bird and Crystal Langhorne have both scored at least 17 in a game. Saturday's game against the Sun marked the 4th-straight contest that four Storm players reached double figures.

AMONG LEAGUE LEADERS

Seattle has several players among the WNBA leaders in the main offensive categories. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart is tied for fourth in the league with 8.8 rebounds per game and tied for fourth with 2.0 blocks per game. Sue Bird is tied for fourth with 4.8 assists per game, while Stewart ranks 10th with 17.4 points per contest and Jewell Loyd ranks fifth with 19.8 points per game. Stewart and Loyd are first and second in the league in minutes per game with averages of 36.2 and 36.0, respectively. Here is where Stewart ranks among rookies: first in points (17.4), first in rebounds (8.8), second in assists (2.4), third in steals (1.6) and first in blocks (2.0).

LIGHTING UP THE SCOREBOARD

Seattle scored 93 points on 32-of-57 shooting vs. Connecticut on 5/28. The last time the team broke the 93-point threshold in a non-overtime game was 9/6/12, when the team defeated Tulsa 101-74. Lauren Jackson scored a team-high 23 points. Seattle did break the 93-point mark once in 2013, in an overtime victory vs. Washington on 6/18/13 in a 96-86 win.

POPPIN' CHAMPAGNE IN FRANCE

On the same day her Seattle team opened the WNBA season, Storm forward Jenna O'Hea captured a championship with French club Lattes Montpiellar. O'Hea's team won 65-63 this past Sunday to take the series-clinching game three. On their way to the title, Lattes Montpiellar won in the semifinal round over Charleville-Mezieres, which features fellow Storm forward Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis. O'Hea, who also won the French Cup the previous year, averaged just under 10 points off the bench for Lattes Montpiellar in 2016. O'Hea made her WNBA season debut last Thursday against Washington after missing the first three games, scoring six points in 14 minutes of action off the

STEWART MAKES HISTORY IN BANKERS LIFE FIELDHOUSE

The last time Storm rookie Breanna Stewart played at the Fever's Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis, she won her fourth consecutive national title and Most Outstanding Player award at the 2016 NCAA Final Four. Stewart notched 24 points, 10 rebounds and six assists as her UConn Huskies took down Syracuse 82-51 in the national championship game. After finishing her college career with a 151-5 record and leading UConn in scoring for three straight seasons, Stewart became the fifth Husky to be selected with the top pick in the WNBA draft (the second by Seattle: Sue Bird, 2002).

NO LONGER UNDER THE (STORM) RADAR

In a game full of superstars – six United States Olympians and six No. 1 draft picks were on the court when the Storm hosted Minnesota on 5/22/16 – it was Alysha Clark who shined the brightest. After totaling four points in the first two games, the fifth-year forward scored seven in the first quarter en route to a career-high 20 on 7-of-13 shooting. Clark had also scored 20 in a preseason game. On the other end of the court, Clark spent most of the night defending one of the best players in the league (Maya Moore) and held her to a season-low 17 points.

SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 15th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is ninth in career steals with 549. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 13 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 549 career steals rank fifth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up two spots on the all-time list this year.

THIRD QUARTER BLUES

In two consecutive games, both the Storm and its opponent started cold from the field in the third quarter. Against Minnesota and Washington, the Storm and its foe made just one field goal apiece in the first five minutes of the second half. Seattle shot a combined 25 percent (9-of-36) in the third quarter of those two games, both losses. The Storm averaged 13 points in those third quarters, while its two opponents averaged 14.5. In its most recent game, the Storm's third quarter was just the opposite, as it exploded for a season-high 31 points on 9-of-13 from the field en route to victory against the Sun.

CRYSTAL CLEAR

Crystal Langhorne shot 8-for-8 from the field on her way to a season-high 18 points in Saturday's win over the Sun, setting a franchise record for field goals without a miss. Langhorne had a game-high eight rebounds and the second-most points in the game, and her 18 points featured her seventh career three-pointer and first since 2014. While going 8-for-8 is certainly an outlier, Langhorne is no stranger to being the most efficient player on the floor. Her career average of 55.9 percent shooting ranks fourth in WNBA history, and she's been in the league's top five in that category every year since joining Seattle.

TEAM NOTES

#ROADTORIO

On Wednesday, April 27, the USA Women's Basketball Team 12-athlete roster for the 2016 Olympics was named. Sue Bird was named to her fourth Olympic team, going for her fourth Gold medal. Storm rookie Breanna Stewart was also named to the team. This is the first time in Storm history that the active roster had two members on an Olympic roster. Stewart and Bird won a gold medal together at the 2014 FIBA World Championships.

TAK-ING THE WNBA BY STORM

Seattle's Jewell Loyd won Rookie of the Year in 2015, but teammate Ramu Tokashiki wasn't too far behind her in terms of statistical dominance compared to other first-year players. Tokashiki was third among rookies in points (8.3 per game), third in blocks (0.9), fourth in minutes (20.6) and second in free throw shooting behind Loyd (86.2 percent). She ranked in the top 20 of the entire WNBA in free throw shooting and overall plus-minus rating. Tokashiki played in 30 games for the Storm, leading the team in scoring four times and posting a team high in blocks 17 times.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

Seattle owned the No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft for the second straight year, the second time a WNBA team has selected first back-to-back years. After doing so in 2001 and 2002, the Storm won its first WNBA title within three seasons. Including Lauren Jackson and Sue Bird, seven of the players taken No. 1 overall in the WNBA Draft between 2001 and 2013 have won at least one title. In the NBA, having back-to-back top picks has proven to deliver even quicker success: All three times NBA franchises have chosen first overall in consecutive years since 1965, they have made the NBA finals within two seasons (Orlando Magic 1992-93, Houston Rockets 1983-84, Cleveland Cavaliers 2013-14).

STEWART'S STORM

During a historic, unprecedented career at Connecticut, Breanna Stewart won four consecutive national championships and guided the Huskies to a pair of perfect seasons (2013-14 and 2015-16). She was named Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four in all four of her team's title runs and won AP Player of the Year three straight seasons. A four-year starter at Connecticut, Stewart becomes the fifth Husky to be selected with the top pick in the WNBA draft. She finished her college career with a 151-5 record after leading the Huskies in scoring for the past three seasons. During her senior year, Stewart averaged 19.4 points, 8.7 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.4 blocks per game while shooting 57.9 percent from the field and 42.6 percent from the 3-point line. Stewart is the only player in Division I women's basketball history to record 300 blocks and 300 assists in her career. At the 2013 Final Four, she became the first freshman in 26 years to earn the tournament's Most Outstanding Player award. Stewart has also played for the United States National Team, helping the USA win gold at the 2014 FIBA World Championship.

OFFENSE ON-POINT

Led by 26 points from Jewell Loyd and 18 from Crystal Langhorne, Seattle had its best offensive performance of the season in Saturday's victory over Connecticut. The Storm set season highs in points (93), field goal percentage (56.1 percent), assists (16) and free throws (23). All five starters reached double figures for the Storm, as Sue Bird added 14 while Breanna Stewart and Alysha Clark each scored 11. Seattle used a 21-2 run in the third quarter to pull away from the Sun. The Storm put up 31 in the third period and 28 in the first, its two highest-scoring quarters of the season.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 360 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. The 2015 season saw Bird fall just .4 assists per game short of leading the league in the category (Courtney Vandersloot, 5.8 apg, 2015).

BOUCEK BACK FOR YEAR 2

Now in her fifth season as a WNBA head coach and second with the Seattle Storm, Jenny Boucek is tasked with guiding the Storm back to the playoffs for the first time since 2013. The club was 10-24 this past season, finishing four games out of the playoff race. Prior to taking over as head coach in Seattle last year, Boucek held the same role for the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs from 2007-09. She was an assistant coach in Seattle from 2003-05 and 2010-14 – Boucek was around for both of the team's WNBA titles – before being promoted to head coach. The Storm made improvements in a few different areas after Boucek took over, namely on the defensive end. Seattle's opponents scored just 7.1 fast break points per game last season, good for second in the WNBA. The Storm also allowed just 30.5 points in the paint on average, the fourth best mark in the league.

JENNY BOUCEK

On January 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was announced as the head coach of the Seattle Storm, the fourth head coach in the history of the franchise.

Boucek spent four seasons with the Storm under the leadership of Agler, rejoining the Storm in 2010 as the Director of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach prior to the start of the 2014 season.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since its inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-America team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
