SERIES NOTES

- In the teams' last meeting on 6/1/16 in Indiana, the Fever limited the Storm to only one offensive rebound while allowing no second-chance points.
- Indiana forced a season-high 20 turnovers while outscoring the Storm, 19-12, in second-chance points. The Fever led by as many as 22 points (72-50, 1:04 remaining in the third quarter) during the last match-up.
- Seattle has not won in Indiana in 7 seasons. The last time Seattle won in Indiana was on 7/18/08, toppling the Fever 65-59.
- When the teams met on 8/21/15, Seattle shot a blistering 68.0 percent from the floor in the first half. Indiana outscored Seattle 30-9 during the third quarter, going 9-for-17 from the field, compared to Seattle's 3-for-15 en route to the 63-75 win over the Storm.

2016 RESULTS VS. INDIANA

Seattle 75, Indiana 85 - Bankers Trust Fieldhouse, Indianapolis, Ind. (6/1/16)

The Seattle Storm fell 85-75 to the Indiana Fever on Wednesday at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. The Storm drops to 2-4 on the season, while Indiana (3-3) jumps ahead of Seattle in the WNBA standings by snapping its two-game losing streak. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart paced the Storm with a game-high 22 points, including 16 in the second half. Stewart passed 100 career points late in the fourth quarter and has now scored 20 or more in three of her six games. Fellow first-year player Tiffany Mitchell recorded 19 for the Fever, and reserve Lynetta Kizer led Indiana with 20 points on 8-of-13 shooting. Seattle was without starting forward Alysha Clark, who made the trip but was inactive with a right knee bruise. Jenna O'Hea made her first start of the season, scoring six points in 25 minutes. Indiana built its lead on Wednesday through a dominant first half. The Storm scored the first seven points of the game, but Indiana responded by draining a couple of three-pointers during an 18-7 run that led to a four-point lead at the end of the first quarter. Seattle shot efficiently from the field throughout the first half, but eight turnovers in the opening quarter and four giveaways in the second caused the Storm to fall behind. The Storm finished 53.8 percent from the field for the night, but 20 total turnovers compared to 14 for Indiana made the difference. Despite six first-half assists by Sue Bird, Indiana was ahead 51-38 at halftime behind 13 points from Mitchell. The Fever finished the half on an 11-1 run after Seattle had cut the lead to three at 40-37 at the 2:45 mark. In the first half, Seattle converted just two of its eight three-point attempts, while Indiana sank a trio of shots from beyond the arc on just four attempts. The Storm ended with a three-point percentage of 27.8 (5-for-18) on Wednesday, while Indiana finished 6-of-13 from long distance. The Storm committed turnovers on each of its first three possessions of the second half, allowing Indiana to increase its lead to as many as 21 in the third quarter. Seattle gradually cut into the deficit in the final period behind a late surge from Stewart, but it wasn't enough to overcome the Fever on the road. Bird added 14 points and six assists on Wednesday, while Jewell Loyd notched 11 points and four rebounds. Rookie guard Blake Dietrick made her WNBA debut, checking in late in the fourth quarter and recording four minutes of action.

Seattle 76, Connecticut, 77 - Mohegan Sun Arena, Uncasville, Conn (6/10/16)

Connecticut Sun forward Alyssa Thomas scored the final four points of the contest, including a game-winning layup with less than one second remaining, to sink the Seattle Storm 77-76 on Friday at Mohegan Sun Arena. Sue Bird scored a season-high 24 points for the Storm, while fellow UConn alum Breanna Stewart had 10 points and 12 rebounds in her first WNBA game in the state of Connecticut. Ahead for nearly the entire night, the Storm had a 73-70 lead with one minute remaining when Sun forward Morgan Tuck drained a three-pointer to tie the game. Seattle guard Jewell Loyd responded with a three-pointer of her own, and Thomas made two free throws on the subsequent possession to make it 76-75 in favor of the Storm with 33 seconds to go. Bird then missed a jumper late in the shot clock, and Connecticut called timeout with 8.8 seconds on the game clock. Thomas scored on a putback of Camille Little's miss with 0.6 seconds remaining to clinch the win for Connecticut. Tuck, who won four consecutive national titles with Stewart at UConn, scored a career-high 20 points off the bench for the Sun. Stewart, who ranks third in the league with 10.1 rebounds per game, recorded her fourth double-double of the season. Bird scored 17 of her game-high 24 points in the first half, finishing 9-for-15 on the night to go with a game-high eight assists. The Storm drops to 3-6 on the year, while Connecticut (2-7) snaps a six-game losing streak and evens the season series after Seattle had beaten the Sun on May 28 at KeyArena. Connecticut went on a 9-0 run spanning the end of the first and beginning of the second quarter to take a three-point lead, but Seattle would regain the advantage just minutes later thanks in part to Bird's second three-pointer. Bird continued to dominate in the second quarter, and the 15-year veteran led the Storm on an 11-2 spurt to close out the half with a 38-28 lead. Connecticut shot 28.6 percent in the first half, including 0-for-7 from three-point range. The Storm opened up a 14-point lead early in the third quarter, but Connecticut responded with another 9-0 run to pull within five. After missing her first seven shots, Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis, another UConn alum, scored seven clutch points in the fourth quarter for the Storm. But it wasn't enough.

PREVIOUS GAME

Seattle 78, New York 86 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (6/5/16)

After trimming a 17-point deficit to just three late in the fourth quarter, the Seattle Storm wasn't able to complete the comeback, falling 86-78 to the New York Liberty on Sunday at KeyArena. Veteran forward Alysha Clark scored a career-high 23 points on 7-of-7 shooting for the Storm, which drops to 3- 5 on the season with Sunday's defeat. Seattle forward Breanna Stewart set the franchise's rookie record for rebounds in a game with 17, while Sue Bird recorded a double-double with 13 points and a season-high 10 assists. New York was paced by forward Tina Charles and guard Sugar Rodgers, who scored 19 and 18 points, respectively. The teams played a very even opening half, as there were nine lead changes and neither club had more than a five-point advantage. Clark, who returned to the starting lineup after coming off the bench Friday due to a right knee bruise, was 5-for-5 in the first half to lead Seattle with 14 points. Ramu Tokashiki added 10 first-half points off the bench on her way to a season-high 15, while Charles finished the half with 13 points after missing her first three shot attempts. Coming off a career-high 32 points against Phoenix, Storm guard Jewell Loyd took just two shots in the first half and even had a rare miss at the free throw line. Loyd and Stewart, who went to the bench with her third foul early in the second quarter, combined for just five points in the first half and 11 in the game. New York held a 46-45 edge at the break, then proceeded to go on an 11-2 run early in the third quarter behind two baskets apiece from Swin Cash and Sugar Rodgers. The Liberty continued to dominate the period and opened up a 17-point lead, outscoring Seattle 26-13 in the third. Trailing by 14 to start the fourth quarter, the Storm used a 13-2 spurt midway through the period to cut its deficit to five behind seven of Clark's game-high 23 points. New York's lead was just three with 3:45 remaining after another Clark jumper, but Rodgers made four free throws down the stretch to help the Liberty hold on. The Storm shot just 5-of-22 from three-point range on Sunday, and New York dominated the glass by outrebounding Seattle 40-31. Former Storm players Cash and Tanisha Wright finished with six and eight points, respectively, for the Liberty (4-3).

PLAYER NOTES

JEWELL'S A GEM

When the Seattle Storm and Phoenix Mercury met for the first time this year on May 20, Jewell Loyd scored a career-high 30 points, including the game-winning jumper that gave Seattle an 81-80 victory. On June 3 at KeyArena, Loyd once again posted a new career high against Phoenix, notching 32 points to guide the Storm to a 95-81 win. Loyd, who reached the 500-point milestone on June 3, became the third player in franchise history to score 30 on multiple occasions. It was the most points scored by a Storm player since Lauren Jackson posted 33 in 2010 against Phoenix. Loyd, the reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year finished 12-of-18 from the field and 4-for-7 from three-point range, scoring 19 in the first half alone. It was her fourth 20-point game of the year, and the Notre Dame product also set career highs with nine rebounds and five offensive boards.

STEWART CLAIMS ROOKIE OF THE MONTH

Storm rookie forward Breanna Stewart was named the WNBA Rookie of the Month presented by Samsung for games played in May. In May, Stewart led all rookies in points (17.4 ppg), rebounds (8.8 rpg) and blocks (2.0 bpg) and was second in assists (2.4 apg) in five games. She tied for third among all WNBA players in rebounds and blocks and ranked 10th in points while equaling the league high in minutes (36.2 mpg). Stewart scored in double digits every night and recorded a pair of double-doubles as Seattle won two of its five games in May.

POPPIN' CHAMPAGNE IN FRANCE

On the same day her Seattle team opened the WNBA season, Storm forward Jenna O'Hea captured a championship with French club Lattes Montpiellar. O'Hea's team won 65-63 on May 15 to take the series-clinching game three. On their way to the title, Lattes Montpiellar won in the semifinal round over Charleville-Mezieres, which features fellow Storm forward Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis. O'Hea, who also won the French Cup the previous year, averaged just under 10 points off the bench for Lattes Montpiellar in 2016. O'Hea made her WNBA season debut on May 26 against Washington after missing the first three games, scoring six points in 14 minutes of action off the bench.

20+ CLUB

In the season opener against Los Angeles, Seattle had two players score 20-plus points: Reigning Rookie of the Year Jewell Loyd had 20 on 6-of-14 shooting, while 2016 No. 1 draft pick Breanna Stewart notched a team-high 23 points on 9-of-13 from the field. Only once in 2015 did the Storm have two players score at least 20 points. With Loyd notching a career-high 32 points against Phoenix, Alysha Clark scoring a career-high 23 vs. New York and Sue Bird notching 24 at Connecticut, Seattle has had four different 20-point scorers and four different leading scorers in nine games. Crystal Langhorne also came close with 18 in a game. Last Sunday's game against New York marked the sixth contest out of nine in which four Storm players reached double figures.

SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 15th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is ninth in career steals with 555. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 13 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 549 career steals rank fifth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up two spots on the all-time list this year.

MIGHT WANT TO GUARD HER

Crystal Langhorne sits in fourth all-time on the WNBA's FG% charts. A career 55.9% shooter, Langhorne has led the Storm in scoring since joining the team and in consecutive seasons (2014, 2015).

CRYSTAL CLEAR

Crystal Langhorne shot 8-for-8 from the field on her way to a season-high 18 points in the May 28 win over the Sun, setting a franchise record for field goals without a miss. Langhorne had a game-high eight rebounds and the second-most points in the game, and her 18 points featured her seventh career three-pointer and first since 2014. While going 8-for-8 is certainly an outlier, Langhorne is no stranger to being the most efficient player on the floor. Her career average of 55.9 percent shooting ranks fourth in WNBA history, and she's been in the league's top five in that category every year since joining Seattle.

MULTI-30+ GAMES IN A SINGLE SEASON

Nine games into 2016, Jewell Loyd has put up 30+ points in a single game twice. Three-time MVP Lauren Jackson is the only other player in a Storm jersey to accomplish this feat, which she has done in 6 seasons (2003, 2004, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010). Jackson's single-season best was in 2007, when she passed the mark 9 times, including her 47-point outburst on July 24, 2007 at Washington in an overtime contest, a then-WNBA single-game scoring record. Jackson would go on to win WNBA MVP honors that season.

TRIPLE-DOUBLE WATCH...

Breanna Stewart nearly became the youngest and fastest player in WNBA history to record a triple-double with her 14-point, 10-rebound, 9-assist effort on 6/3/16 vs. Phoenix. The evening did mark her third double-double of her short career, just seven games in. Should she accomplish the feat, she will join elite company. There have been just five triple-doubles in WNBA history.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 330 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. The 2015 season saw Bird fall just .4 assists per game short of leading the league in the category (Courtney Vandersloot, 5.8 apg, 2015).

PLAYER NOTES

NO LONGER UNDER THE (STORM) RADAR

In a game full of superstars – six United States Olympians and six No. 1 draft picks were on the court when the Storm hosted Minnesota on 5/22/16 – it was Alysha Clark who shined the brightest. After totaling four points in the first two games, the fifth-year forward scored seven in the first quarter en route to a career-high 20 on 7-of-13 shooting. Clark had also scored 20 in a preseason game. On the other end of the court, Clark spent most of the night defending one of the best players in the league (Maya Moore) and held her to a season-low 17 points.

DIETRICK'S DEBUT

Storm rookie point guard Blake Dietrick made her WNBA debut on June 1 at Indiana, recording four minutes of action in the fourth quarter. After graduating from Princeton in 2015, Dietrick had preseason stints with the Mystics and Sparks, but neither panned out. As a senior at Princeton, she guided the Tigers to a 30-0 regular season and their first NCAA Tournament win. She was chosen as an AP All-American honorable mention after setting the program record for assists in a season. This past winter, Dietrick scored 15.5 points per game for Italian club Orvieto.

TAK-ING THE WNBA BY STORM

Seattle's Jewell Loyd won Rookie of the Year in 2015, but teammate Ramu Tokashiki wasn't too far behind her in terms of statistical dominance compared to other first-year players. Tokashiki was third among rookies in points (8.3 per game), third in blocks (0.9), fourth in minutes (20.6) and second in free throw shooting behind Loyd (86.2 percent). She ranked in the top 20 of the entire WNBA in free throw shooting and overall plus-minus rating. Tokashiki played in 30 games for the Storm, leading the team in scoring four times and posting a team high in blocks 17 times.

CLARK TAKES CHARGE

Alysha Clark scored 23 points on 7-of-7 shooting against New York on Sunday, marking a new career high for the veteran forward after she had scored 20 against Minnesota earlier this season. Clark, who returned to the starting lineup after coming off the bench in the previous game due to a knee bruise, was 5-for-5 in the first half to lead Seattle with 14 points. In her fifth year with Seattle, Clark is averaging 10.0 points per game on 50 percent shooting and 45 percent from three-point range (one of the league's best percentages among those who have taken 15 threes). She has recorded the first two 20-point outings of her career, and in a five-game stretch, she put up 13.8 points per night on 61.8 percent shooting. Among players averaging at least 15 minutes per game, Clark has the highest true shooting and effective field goal percentages in the WNBA for the second straight season.

TIPOFF QUEEN

Other than May 20 against the Phoenix Mercury, Storm rookie forward Breanna Stewart has controlled every opening tipoff so far this season. Stewart, the 6-4 product of Connecticut who was selected No. 1 overall in the 2016 WNBA Draft, is aided on opening tipoffs by her 7-1 wingspan. The only one she has lost so far, in the Phoenix game on May 20, was against 6-9 center Brittney Griner.

BOSS OF THE BOARDS

On Sunday against New York, Storm rookie Breanna Stewart pulled down a career-high 17 rebounds, toppling the previous franchise rookie record ([13, Lauren Jackson, 7/27/01, vs. Phoenix] and Stewart [13, 2 times]) and setting a new 2016 league-wide single-game high. Stewart ranks third in the league with 10.1 rebounds per game, and she has recorded a double-double with points and rebounds in four of her nine games.

PICKING UP THE PACE

In 2015, Crystal Langhorne led the Storm in scoring with 11.1 points per game as the team finished 10-24. Nine games into this season, Seattle has three players averaging better than 12 points per contest (Jewell Loyd - 17.1; Breanna Stewart - 15.7; and Sue Bird - 13.9). As a team, the Storm has also increased its average scoring output from 70.4 points per game in 2014 to 79.7 this year and its field goal percentage from 43.4 to 46.0 percent. Four different players are averaging double figures for the first time since 2013.

BIRD: WISEST OWL OF THEM ALL

By the numbers, 35-year-old point guard Sue Bird has been even more dominant this year than her previous couple of seasons. Her 13.9 points per game are the two-time champion's most since 2011, while her 6.0 assists per contest are the most since the 2010 title-winning season. With 2.57 assists for every turnover, Bird boasts her best assist-to-turnover ratio since 2012. Her 3.0 rebounds per game, 46.7 percent shooting, 41.0 percent from the three-point line and 88.5 percent on free throws are also personal bests since 2012.

TOP ROOKIES BATTLE IT OUT

In Sunday's game between Indiana and Seattle, the top two scoring rookies in the league will duel for the second time. Storm forward Breanna Stewart leads all first-year players with 15.7 points per game, while Fever rookie guard Tiffany Mitchell is close behind her with 14.1 points per contest. They are also both in the top three among rookies in assists: Stewart averages 2.9 helpers per game, and Mitchell averages 1.6. When they met for the first time this season, Stewart had a game-high 22 points and Mitchell scored 19 in a Fever victory.

STEWART'S STORM

During a historic, unprecedented career at Connecticut, Breanna Stewart won four consecutive national championships and guided the Huskies to a pair of perfect seasons (2013-14 and 2015-16). She was named Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four in all four of her team's title runs and won AP Player of the Year three straight seasons. A four-year starter at Connecticut, Stewart becomes the fifth Husky to be selected with the top pick in the WNBA draft. She finished her college career with a 151-5 record after leading the Huskies in scoring for the past three seasons. During her senior year, Stewart averaged 19.4 points, 8.7 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.4 blocks per game while shooting 57.9 percent from the field and 42.6 percent from the 3-point line. Stewart is the only player in Division I women's basketball history to record 300 blocks and 300 assists in her career. At the 2013 Final Four, she became the first freshman in 26 years to earn the tournament's Most Outstanding Player award. Stewart has also played for the United States National Team, helping the USA win gold at the 2014 FIBA World Championship.

TEAM NOTES

SUN WINS IN FINAL SECONDS...AGAIN

When the Storm played at Connecticut in 2015, Sun forward Shekinna Stricklen scored off a rebound with 8.2 seconds left to give the host team a one-point victory. On Friday at Mohegan Sun Arena, the exact same sequence occurred, except this time it was Alyssa Thomas who scored the game-winning putback. Thomas scored the final four points of the contest, including a game-winning layup with less than one second remaining, to sink the Storm 77-76. Thomas first knocked down two free throws to make it 76-75 in favor of the Storm with 33 seconds to go. Bird then missed a jumper late in the shot clock, and Connecticut called timeout with 8.8 seconds on the game clock. Thomas scored on a putback of Camille Little's miss with 0.6 seconds remaining to clinch the win for Connecticut.

#ROADTORIO

On Wednesday, April 27, the USA Women's Basketball Team 12-athlete roster for the 2016 Olympics was named. Sue Bird was named to her fourth Olympic team, going for her fourth Gold medal. Storm rookie Breanna Stewart was also named to the team. This is the first time in Storm history that the active roster had two members on an Olympic roster. Stewart and Bird won a gold medal together at the 2014 FIBA World Championships.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

Seattle owned the No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft for the second straight year, the second time a WNBA team has selected first back-to-back years. After doing so in 2001 and 2002, the Storm won its first WNBA title within three seasons. Including Lauren Jackson and Sue Bird, seven of the players taken No. 1 overall in the WNBA Draft between 2001 and 2013 have won at least one title. In the NBA, having back-to-back top picks has proven to deliver even quicker success: All three times NBA franchises have chosen first overall in consecutive years since 1965, they made the NBA finals within two seasons (Orlando Magic 1992-93, Houston Rockets 1983-84, Cleveland Cavaliers 2013-14).

AMONG LEAGUE LEADERS

Nine games into the season, Seattle has several players among the WNBA leaders in the main offensive categories. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart is third in the league with 10.1 rebounds per game and fifth with 1.8 blocks per game. Sue Bird is third with 6.0 assists per game, while Stewart ranks ninth with 15.7 points per contest and Jewell Loyd ranks seventh with 17.1 points per game. Stewart and Loyd are first and third in the league in minutes per game with averages of 34.7 and 33.4, respectively. Here is where Stewart ranks among rookies: first in points (15.7), first in rebounds (10.1), second in assists (2.9), fifth in steals (1.2) and first in blocks (1.8). She was named WNBA Rookie of the Month for May.

LIGHTING UP THE SCOREBOARD

On June 3 against Phoenix, Seattle had its best offensive outing of the year, recording season highs in points (95), three-pointers (12) and assists (25). The 12 three-pointers were two shy of a franchise record, and the 95 points were Seattle's most since 2012. Four starters reached double figures, while Jewell Loyd and Breanna Stewart had incredible stat lines: Loyd notched a career-high 32 points on 12-of-18 shooting, while Stewart finished just shy of having the franchise's second-ever triple-double with 14 points, 10 rebounds and nine assists. The performance came six days after the Storm had set then-season highs in points (93) and assists (16) in a win over Connecticut. All five starters reached double figures against the Sun, when the Storm put up 31 in the third period and 28 in the first, its two highest-scoring quarters of the season.

IT'S RAINING IN SEATTLE

In 2015, 23.8 percent of the shots Seattle took were three-pointers, one of the highest marks in the WNBA. That percentage was even higher during the previous five seasons, when the Storm was always either first or second in the category. This year could be similar, as 10 of the 12 players on Seattle's roster have proven to be threats from three-point range. Through nine games of the 2016 season, 179 of Seattle's 559 (32.0 percent) of Seattle's shots have been three-pointers. The Storm ranks second in the league with 19.9 attempted per game, and seventh with a 33.0 percent conversion rate.

THIRD QUARTER BLUES

Against Minnesota and Washington last month, both the Storm and its opponent started cold from the field in the third quarter. They made just one field goal apiece in the first five minutes of the second half. Seattle shot a combined 25 percent (9-of-36) in the third quarter of those two games. The Storm averaged 13 points in those quarters, while its two opponents averaged 14.5. Seattle's troubles returned vs. Indiana on June 1, when it committed three straight turnovers and had one field goal in the first 4:50 of the third quarter. On Sunday against New York, the Storm once again had just one field goal in the first 4:50 of the third quarter. Friday at Connecticut, the Storm had a 14-point lead trimmed to four during the third quarter.

BOUCEK BACK FOR YEAR 2

Now in her fifth season as a WNBA head coach and second with the Seattle Storm, Jenny Boucek is tasked with guiding the Storm back to the playoffs for the first time since 2013. The club was 10-24 this past season, finishing four games out of the playoff race. Prior to taking over as head coach in Seattle last year, Boucek held the same role for the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs from 2007-09. She was an assistant coach in Seattle from 2003-05 and 2010-14 – Boucek was around for both of the team's WNBA titles – before being promoted to head coach. The Storm made improvements in a few different areas after Boucek took over, namely on the defensive end. Seattle's opponents scored just 7.1 fast break points per game last season, good for second in the WNBA. The Storm also allowed just 30.5 points in the paint on average, the fourth best mark in the league.

JENNY BOUCEK

On January 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was announced as the head coach of the Seattle Storm, the fourth head coach in the history of the franchise.

Boucek spent four seasons with the Storm under the leadership of Agler, rejoining the Storm in 2010 as the Director of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach prior to the start of the 2014 season.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since its inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-America team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
