## LAST GAME

Seattle 75, Indiana 85 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse, Indianapolis, Ind. (6/1/16)

The Seattle Storm fell 85-75 to the Indiana Fever and dropped to 2-4 on the season, while Indiana (3-3) jumps ahead of Seattle in the WNBA standings by snapping its two-game losing streak. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart paced the Storm with a game-high 22 points, including 16 in the second half. Stewart passed 100 career points late in the fourth quarter and has now scored 20 or more in three of her six games. Fellow first-year player Tiffany Mitchell recorded 19 for the Fever, and reserve Lynetta Kizer led Indiana with 20 points on 8-of-13 shooting. Seattle was without starting forward Alysha Clark, who was inactive with a right knee bruise. Jenna O'Hea made her first start of the season, scoring six points in 25 minutes. The Storm scored the first seven points of the game, but Indiana responded by draining a couple of three-pointers during an 18-7 run that led to a four-point lead at the end of the first quarter. Seattle shot efficiently from the field throughout the first half, but eight turnovers in the opening quarter and four giveaways in the second caused the Storm to fall behind. The Storm finished 53.8 percent from the field for the night, but 20 total turnovers compared to 14 for Indiana made the difference. Despite six first-half assists by Sue Bird, Indiana was ahead 51-38 at halftime behind 13 points from Mitchell. The Fever finished the half on an 11-1 run after Seattle had cut the lead to three at 40-37 at the 2:45 mark. In the first half, Seattle converted just two of its eight three-point attempts, while Indiana sank a trio of shots from beyond the arc on just four attempts. The Storm ended with a three-point percentage of 27.8 (5-for-18) on Wednesday, while Indiana finished 6-of-13 from long distance. The Storm committed turnovers on each of its first three possessions of the second half, allowing Indiana to increase its lead to as many as 21 in the third quarter. Bird added 14 points and six assists on Wednesday, while Jewell Loyd notched 11 points and four rebounds. Rookie guard Blake Dietrick made her WNBA debut, checking in late in the fourth quarter and recording four minutes of action.

## PREVIOUS GAME

Seattle 93, Connecticut 81 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (5/28/16)

Jewell Loyd scored a game-high 26 points, including 18 in the second half, to guide the Seattle Storm to a 93-81 win over the Connecticut Sun on Saturday at KeyArena. Crystal Langhorne shot 8-for-8 from the field on her way to a season-high 18 points as the Storm (2-3) picked up its first home victory of the season. Seattle had its best offensive performance of the year on Saturday, setting season highs in points, field goal percentage (56.1 percent), assists (16) and free throws (23). All five Storm starters reached double figures, as Sue Bird added 18 while Breanna Stewart and Alysha Clark each scored 11. Both teams began Saturday's game with hot shooting, with the Storm starting 8-of-10 from the field led by eight quick points from Langhorne. Seattle made 11 of its 17 field goal attempts in the opening period, while the Sun shot 52.9 percent in the first quarter. The Storm held a 28-20 edge after one period. In the second quarter, the Storm led by as many as 12 and held an 11-point edge with 2:26 remaining. But turnovers plagued Seattle late in the half - the Storm committed nine total turnovers in the second quarter - allowing Connecticut to cut into its deficit and pull within two by halftime. The Storm held a 39-37 edge at the break behind 10 points from Langhorne after it scored just two points in the final five minutes of the half. The Storm started with a turnover on its first possession of the second half, but proceeded to blitz the Sun with a 21-2 run behind a trio of Loyd jump shots to open up a 60-41 lead midway through the third quarter. Saturday's third quarter was the opposite of the previous two games for Seattle. It had averaged 13 points on 25 percent shooting in its last two third quarters, but exploded for 31 points on 9-of-13 from the field against the Sun. In the final minutes of the fourth quarter, Langhorne and Clark each made crucial three-pointers to prevent Connecticut from making a comeback. For Langhorne, the three-pointer was the final shot of her perfect night and her first basket from beyond the arc since 2014. The veteran forward had made six career three-pointers prior to Saturday.

## TEAM NOTES

### JEWELL'S A GEM

Jewell Loyd scored a career-high 30 points on 12-of-20 shooting against Phoenix on May 20, including the game-winning jump shot with 2.9 seconds remaining. Loyd, who won Rookie of the Year last season, made more three-pointers in that contest (three) than she did in any game her first year. Before her game-winner in the final seconds, she also hit a crucial jumper with 41.9 seconds left to bring the Storm with-in one. Loyd scored the final 10 points for Seattle, finishing the fourth quarter with 12 on 6-of-7 field goals. She became just the sixth player in franchise history to score 30 points.

### STEWART CLAIMS ROOKIE OF THE MONTH

As announced Thursday, Storm rookie forward Breanna Stewart was named the WNBA Rookie of the Month presented by Samsung for games played in May. In May, Stewart led all rookies in points (17.4 ppg), rebounds (8.8 rpg) and blocks (2.0 bpg) and was second in assists (2.4 apg) in five games. She tied for third among all WNBA players in rebounds and blocks and ranked 10th in points while equaling the league high in minutes (36.2 mpg). Stewart scored in double digits every night and recorded a pair of double-doubles as Seattle won two of its five games in May.

### IT'S RAINING IN SEATTLE

In 2015, 23.8 percent of the shots Seattle took were three-pointers, one of the highest marks in the WNBA. That percentage was even higher during the previous five seasons, when the Storm was always either first or second in the category. This year could be similar, as 10 of the 12 players on Seattle's roster have proven to be threats from three-point range. Through six games of the 2016 season, 108 of Seattle's 359 (30.1 percent) of Seattle's shots have been three-pointers. The Storm ranks fourth in the league with 18.0 attempted per game, and sixth with a 31.5 percent conversion rate.

### 20+ CLUB

In the season opener against Los Angeles, Seattle had two players score 20-plus points: Reigning Rookie of the Year Jewell Loyd had 20 on 6-of-14 shooting, while 2016 No. 1 draft pick Breanna Stewart notched a team-high 23 points on 9-of-13 from the field. Only once in 2015 did the Storm have two players score at least 20 points. With Loyd notching a career-high 30 points against Phoenix and Alysha Clark scoring a career-high 20 vs. Minnesota, Seattle has had three different 20-point scorers and three different leading scorers in five games, and Sue Bird and Crystal Langhorne have both scored at least 17 in a game. Saturday's game against the Sun marked the 4th-straight contest that four Storm players reached double figures.

### AMONG LEAGUE LEADERS

Six games into the season, Seattle has several players among the WNBA leaders in the main offensive categories. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart is fifth in the league with 8.7 rebounds per game and fifth with 1.8 blocks per game. Sue Bird is sixth with 5.0 assists per game, while Stewart ranks ninth with 18.2 points per contest and Jewell Loyd ranks eighth with 18.3 points per game. Stewart and Loyd are second and third in the league in minutes per game with averages of 35.5 and 35.0, respectively. Here is where Stewart ranks among rookies: first in points (18.2), first in rebounds (8.7), second in assists (2.2), third in steals (1.5) and first in blocks (1.8).

### LIGHTING UP THE SCOREBOARD

Seattle scored 93 points on 32-of-57 shooting vs. Connecticut on 5/28. The last time the team broke the 93-point threshold in a non-overtime game was 9/6/12, when the team defeated Tulsa 101-74. Lauren Jackson scored a team-high 23 points. Seattle did break the 93-point mark once in 2013, in an overtime victory vs. Washington on 6/18/13 in a 96-86 win.

### POPPIN' CHAMPAGNE IN FRANCE

On the same day her Seattle team opened the WNBA season, Storm forward Jenna O'Hea captured a championship with French club Lattes Montpiellar. O'Hea's team won 65-63 this past Sunday to take the series-clinching game three. On their way to the title, Lattes Montpiellar won in the semifinal round over Charleville-Mezieres, which features fellow Storm forward Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis. O'Hea, who also won the French Cup the previous year, averaged just under 10 points off the bench for Lattes Montpiellar in 2016. O'Hea made her WNBA season debut last Thursday against Washington after missing the first three games, scoring six points in 14 minutes of action off the

### NO LONGER UNDER THE (STORM) RADAR

In a game full of superstars – six United States Olympians and six No. 1 draft picks were on the court when the Storm hosted Minnesota on 5/22/16 – it was Alysha Clark who shined the brightest. After totaling four points in the first two games, the fifth-year forward scored seven in the first quarter en route to a career-high 20 on 7-of-13 shooting. Clark had also scored 20 in a preseason game. On the other end of the court, Clark spent most of the night defending one of the best players in the league (Maya Moore) and held her to a season-low 17 points.

### SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 15th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is ninth in career steals with 549. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 13 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 549 career steals rank fifth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up two spots on the all-time list this year.

### THIRD QUARTER BLUES

Against Minnesota and Washington last month, both the Storm and its opponent started cold from the field in the third quarter. They made just one field goal apiece in the first five minutes of the second half. Seattle shot a combined 25 percent (9-of-36) in the third quarter of those two games. The Storm averaged 13 points in those quarters, while its two opponents averaged 14.5. In its next game vs. Connecticut, the Storm's third quarter was just the opposite: a season-high 31 points on 9-of-13 shooting. Seattle's troubles returned vs. Indiana on Wednesday, when it committed three straight turnovers and had one field goal in the first 4:50 of the third quarter.

### CRYSTAL CLEAR

Crystal Langhorne shot 8-for-8 from the field on her way to a season-high 18 points in Saturday's win over the Sun, setting a franchise record for field goals without a miss. Langhorne had a game-high eight rebounds and the second-most points in the game, and her 18 points featured her seventh career three-pointer and first since 2014. While going 8-for-8 is certainly an outlier, Langhorne is no stranger to being the most efficient player on the floor. Her career average of 55.9 percent shooting ranks fourth in WNBA history, and she's been in the league's top five in that category every year since joining Seattle.

## TEAM NOTES

### #ROADTORIO

On Wednesday, April 27, the USA Women's Basketball Team 12-athlete roster for the 2016 Olympics was named. Sue Bird was named to her fourth Olympic team, going for her fourth Gold medal. Storm rookie Breanna Stewart was also named to the team. This is the first time in Storm history that the active roster had two members on an Olympic roster. Stewart and Bird won a gold medal together at the 2014 FIBA World Championships.

### TAK-ING THE WNBA BY STORM

Seattle's Jewell Loyd won Rookie of the Year in 2015, but teammate Ramu Tokashiki wasn't too far behind her in terms of statistical dominance compared to other first-year players. Tokashiki was third among rookies in points (8.3 per game), third in blocks (0.9), fourth in minutes (20.6) and second in free throw shooting behind Loyd (86.2 percent). She ranked in the top 20 of the entire WNBA in free throw shooting and overall plus-minus rating. Tokashiki played in 30 games for the Storm, leading the team in scoring four times and posting a team high in blocks 17 times.

### HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

Seattle owned the No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft for the second straight year, the second time a WNBA team has selected first back-to-back years. After doing so in 2001 and 2002, the Storm won its first WNBA title within three seasons. Including Lauren Jackson and Sue Bird, seven of the players taken No. 1 overall in the WNBA Draft between 2001 and 2013 have won at least one title. In the NBA, having back-to-back top picks has proven to deliver even quicker success: All three times NBA franchises have chosen first overall in consecutive years since 1965, they made the NBA finals within two seasons (Orlando Magic 1992-93, Houston Rockets 1983-84, Cleveland Cavaliers 2013-14).

### STEWART'S STORM

During a historic, unprecedented career at Connecticut, Breanna Stewart won four consecutive national championships and guided the Huskies to a pair of perfect seasons (2013-14 and 2015-16). She was named Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four in all four of her team's title runs and won AP Player of the Year three straight seasons. A four-year starter at Connecticut, Stewart becomes the fifth Husky to be selected with the top pick in the WNBA draft. She finished her college career with a 151-5 record after leading the Huskies in scoring for the past three seasons. During her senior year, Stewart averaged 19.4 points, 8.7 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.4 blocks per game while shooting 57.9 percent from the field and 42.6 percent from the 3-point line. Stewart is the only player in Division I women's basketball history to record 300 blocks and 300 assists in her career. At the 2013 Final Four, she became the first freshman in 26 years to earn the tournament's Most Outstanding Player award. Stewart has also played for the United States National Team, helping the USA win gold at the 2014 FIBA World Championship.

### OFFENSE ON-POINT

Led by 26 points from Jewell Loyd and 18 from Crystal Langhorne, Seattle had its best offensive performance of the season in Saturday's victory over Connecticut. The Storm set season highs in points (93), field goal percentage (56.1 percent), assists (16) and free throws (23). All five starters reached double figures for the Storm, as Sue Bird added 14 while Breanna Stewart and Alysha Clark each scored 11. Seattle used a 21-2 run in the third quarter to pull away from the Sun. The Storm put up 31 in the third period and 28 in the first, its two highest-scoring quarters of the season.

### ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 354 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. The 2015 season saw Bird fall just .4 assists per game short of leading the league in the category (Courtney Vandersloot, 5.8 avg, 2015).

### DIETRICK'S DEBUT

Storm rookie point guard Blake Dietrick made her WNBA debut on Wednesday at Indiana, recording four minutes of action in the fourth quarter. After graduating from Princeton in 2015, Dietrick had preseason stints with the Mystics and Sparks, but neither panned out. As a senior at Princeton, she guided the Tigers to a 30-0 regular season and their first NCAA Tournament win. She was chosen as an AP All-American honorable mention after setting the program record for assists in a season. This past winter, Dietrick scored 15.5 points per game for Italian club Orvieto.

### BOUCEK BACK FOR YEAR 2

Now in her fifth season as a WNBA head coach and second with the Seattle Storm, Jenny Boucek is tasked with guiding the Storm back to the playoffs for the first time since 2013. The club was 10-24 this past season, finishing four games out of the playoff race. Prior to taking over as head coach in Seattle last year, Boucek held the same role for the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs from 2007-09. She was an assistant coach in Seattle from 2003-05 and 2010-14 – Boucek was around for both of the team's WNBA titles – before being promoted to head coach. The Storm made improvements in a few different areas after Boucek took over, namely on the defensive end. Seattle's opponents scored just 7.1 fast break points per game last season, good for second in the WNBA. The Storm also allowed just 30.5 points in the paint on average, the fourth best mark in the league.

### JENNY BOUCEK

On January 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was announced as the head coach of the Seattle Storm, the fourth head coach in the history of the franchise.

Boucek spent four seasons with the Storm under the leadership of Agler, rejoining the Storm in 2010 as the Director of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach prior to the start of the 2014 season.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since its inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-America team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
