SERIES NOTES

- Seattle has not defeated New York in the last 6 meetings, the longest win streak for the Liberty vs. the Storm series history. The last win for the Storm was on Aug. 26, 2013, an 84-66 decision at KeyArena.
- Seattle's last win at Madison Square Garden was on June 18, 2010. Sue Bird led the team in scoring with 22 points.
- New York's Tanisha Wright faces her former team for the third time. She is 2-0 vs. Seattle after joining the Liberty as a free agent prior to 2015. Wright played her first ten WNBA seasons with the Storm.

2015 RESULTS VS. NEW YORK

Seattle 77, New York 81 - KeyArena, Seattle, WA. (7/21/15)

The Storm erased a 14-point deficit in the second quarter and it was a see-saw battle the rest of the way but it was unable to come through in the fourth as Seattle lost to the Eastern Conference leading New York Liberty 81-77. New York jumped out early on the Storm and went on a 11-0 run, which was capped off by a three from former longtime Storm guard Tanisha Wright. Seattle had no answer for New York forward Tina Charles as she scored 12 points in the first. Seattle's offense was also slow to get going and the Storm shot 26.7 percent in the period. With 8:39 left in the second, Avery Warley-Talbert hit a layup to give the Liberty a 31-17 lead. That is when Seattle's intensity picked up. Crystal Langhorne checked back in the game and quickly hit a jumper to make it a 12-point game. After another basket from Langhorne made it a 10-point deficit, Sue Bird found Abby Bishop in transition and she drilled the three to cut it to 34-27. Langhorne had 10 of her 12 points in the first half. With 1:48 left in the second and the Storm down one, Alysha Clark converted on the jumper to put Seattle ahead 39-38. It was part of a 19-4 run and the Storm took a 45-40 lead into the half. Clark filled up the stat sheet with nine points, six rebounds, and three assists. Seattle shot 77.8 percent from the field (14-for-18) and outscored New York 32-14 in the second. New York pulled ahead in the third when it put together a 7-0 run to take a 57-54 lead. After the Liberty took a 67-64 lead, Seattle called a timeout and regrouped. Bird came out firing and hit a step back jumper to cut the New York lead to one. Bird scored a team-high 14 points and dished out seven assists. The Liberty pushed the lead back to five and the Storm, once again, fought back. Langhorne converted an and-one chance and Ramu Tokashiki pulled up for the jumper to tie the game at 73 with 2:37 left. Tokashiki also scored 14 points on 6-for-12 from the field. But New York had one final push and went up by three on a basket and a free throw from Swin Cash. The Liberty lead the rest of the way.

Seattle 62, New York 78 - Madison Square Garden, New York, NY (8/2/15)

A strong third quarter from New York put the game out of reach for Seattle as the Storm dropped the matchup 78-62 at Madison Square Garden. Seattle and New York battled back and forth in the first half and saw the lead change hands seven times and the game be tied six times. But in the third, New York stepped up its defensive intensity and went on a 13-0 run to open the quarter and forced the Storm to miss its first six shots and commit three turnovers during the burst, to take a 49-35 lead. Bird, who scored 14 points on the afternoon, broke the run with a three with 5:13 left. That shot moved her past the 5,000-point mark and, in doing so, became the first player in WNBA history to collect 5,000 points and 2,000 assists. She finished Sunday at 5,008 points and is now only five points shy of tying Taj McWilliams-Franklin for 12th on the all-time list. The Storm had one final burst at the beginning of the third quarter when Angel Goodrich hit a three and Jenna O'Hea scored on back-to-back possessions to cut the New York lead down to eight. But the Liberty brought back in Tina Charles and she quickly scored four straight points to move to the lead back to double figures. Charles scored 29 points on the afternoon. The Storm got off to a great start from the field and hit 55.6 percent from the field in the first. This was in large part to the bench. The trio of Abby Bishop, Markeisha Gatling, and O'Hea combined for 10 points on 4-for-6 shooting and Goodrich dished out three assists to help Seattle go into the second tied at 23. The Seattle bench scored 14 points in the first half. Crystal Langhorne was the safety valve for the Storm in the second as New York held Seattle to 5-for-17 from the field but the veteran forward scored six points in the period and finished with a team-high 10 points in the half. Much like in the first matchup when she scored 30 points, Charles scored 14 points in the first half.

LAST GAME

Seattle 95, Phoenix 81 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (6/3/16)

When the Seattle Storm and Phoenix Mercury met for the first time this year on May 20, Jewell Loyd scored a career-high 30 points in a victory for the Storm. Friday night at KeyArena, Loyd once again posted a new career high against Phoenix, notching 32 points to guide Seattle to a 95-81 win. Loyd, who reached the 500-point milestone Friday night, became the third player in franchise history to score 30 on multiple occasions. The reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year finished 12-of-18 from the field and 4-for-7 from three-point range as the Storm improved to 3-4 and moved ahead of Phoenix in the league standings. Loyd had 19 in first half alone, and the Notre Dame product also tied career highs with nine rebounds and four offensive boards. Seattle's 95 points and 12 three-pointers on Friday represent season highs. Four different Storm players had at least 14 points on the night, including rookie forward Breanna Stewart, who finished just shy of a triple-double with 10 rebounds and nine assists. Stewart, who was named WNBA Rookie of the Month for May, recorded her third double-double of the season. The teams went back and forth early in the first quarter, but the Storm gained a lead midway through the period that it never relinquished the rest of the way. Seattle was ahead by double digits throughout the fourth quarter and led by as many as 16. After a poor three-point shooting night on Wednesday in a loss at Indiana, the Storm made five of its first eight attempts and finished 8-of-14 in the first half to build its lead. Jenna O'Hea, making her second straight start, hit four three-pointers on seven attempts Friday night to lead the outside-shooting barrage alongside Loyd. Storm forward Alysha Clark, after missing the previous game due to a knee bruise, came off the bench Friday and scored five points in 18 minutes. Friday's win marked Seattle's first home victory over Phoenix in the last five matchups at KeyArena. The Mercury was led by Penny Taylor, who started 6-for-6 from the field and finished with 19 points. The Storm held former MVP Diana Taurasi to eight points on 3-of-9 shooting.

PREVIOUS GAME

Seattle 75, Indiana 85 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse, Indianapolis, Ind. (6/1/16)

The Seattle Storm fell 85-75 to the Indiana Fever and dropped to 2-4 on the season, while Indiana (3-3) jumps ahead of Seattle in the WNBA standings by snapping its two-game losing streak. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart paced the Storm with a game-high 22 points, including 16 in the second half. Stewart passed 100 career points late in the fourth quarter and has now scored 20 or more in three of her six games. Fellow first-year player Tiffany Mitchell recorded 19 for the Fever, and reserve Lynetta Kizer led Indiana with 20 points on 8-of-13 shooting. Seattle was without starting forward Alysha Clark, who was inactive with a right knee bruise. Jenna O'Hea made her first start of the season, scoring six points in 25 minutes. The Storm scored the first seven points of the game, but Indiana responded by draining a couple of three-pointers during an 18-7 run that led to a four-point lead at the end of the first quarter. Seattle shot efficiently from the field throughout the first half, but eight turnovers in the opening quarter and four giveaways in the second caused the Storm to fall behind. The Storm finished 53.8 percent from the field for the night, but 20 total turnovers compared to 14 for Indiana made the difference. Despite six first-half assists by Sue Bird, Indiana was ahead 51-38 at halftime behind 13 points from Mitchell. The Fever finished the half on an 11-1 run after Seattle had cut the lead to three at 40-37 at the 2:45 mark. In the first half, Seattle converted just two of its eight three-point attempts, while Indiana sank a trio of shots from beyond the arc on just four attempts. The Storm ended with a three-point percentage of 27.8 (5-for-18) on Wednesday, while Indiana finished 6-of-13 from long distance. The Storm committed turnovers on each of its first three possessions of the second half, allowing Indiana to increase its lead to as many as 21 in the third quarter. Bird added 14 points and six assists on Wednesday, while Jewell Loyd notched 11 points and four rebounds. Rookie guard Blake Dietrick made her WNBA debut, checking in late in the fourth quarter and recording four minutes of action.

The Seattle bench scored 14 points in the first half. Crystal Langhorne was the safety valve for the Storm in the second as New York held Seattle to 5-for-17 from the field but the veteran forward scored six points in the period and finished with a team-high 10 points in the half. Much like in the first matchup when she scored 30 points, Charles scored 14 points in the first half.

PLAYER NOTES

JEWELL'S A GEM

When the Seattle Storm and Phoenix Mercury met for the first time this year on May 20, Jewell Loyd scored a career-high 30 points, including the game-winning jumper that gave Seattle an 81-80 victory. Friday night at KeyArena, Loyd once again posted a new career high against Phoenix, notching 32 points to guide the Storm to a 95-81 win. Loyd, who reached the 500-point milestone Friday night, became the third player in franchise history to score 30 on multiple occasions. It was the most points scored by a Storm player since Lauren Jackson posted 33 in 2010 against Phoenix. Loyd, the reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year finished 12-of-18 from the field and 4-for-7 from three-point range, scoring 19 in the first half alone. It was her fourth 20-point game of the year, and the Notre Dame product also set career highs with nine rebounds and five offensive boards.

STEWART CLAIMS ROOKIE OF THE MONTH

As announced Thursday, Storm rookie forward Breanna Stewart was named the WNBA Rookie of the Month presented by Samsung for games played in May. In May, Stewart led all rookies in points (17.4 ppg), rebounds (8.8 rpg) and blocks (2.0 bpg) and was second in assists (2.4 apg) in five games. She tied for third among all WNBA players in rebounds and blocks and ranked 10th in points while equaling the league high in minutes (36.2 mpg). Stewart scored in double digits every night and recorded a pair of double-doubles as Seattle won two of its five games in May.

POPPIN' CHAMPAGNE IN FRANCE

On the same day her Seattle team opened the WNBA season, Storm forward Jenna O'Hea captured a championship with French club Lattes Montpiellar. O'Hea's team won 65-63 on May 15 to take the series-clinching game three. On their way to the title, Lattes Montpiellar won in the semifinal round over Charleville-Mezieres, which features fellow Storm forward Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis. O'Hea, who also won the French Cup the previous year, averaged just under 10 points off the bench for Lattes Montpiellar in 2016. O'Hea made her WNBA season debut last Thursday against Washington after missing the first three games, scoring six points in 14 minutes of action off the bench.

20+ CLUB

In the season opener against Los Angeles, Seattle had two players score 20-plus points: Reigning Rookie of the Year Jewell Loyd had 20 on 6-of-14 shooting, while 2016 No. 1 draft pick Breanna Stewart notched a team-high 23 points on 9-of-13 from the field. Only once in 2015 did the Storm have two players score at least 20 points. With Loyd notching a career-high 30 points against Phoenix and Alysha Clark scoring a career-high 20 vs. Minnesota, Seattle has had three different 20-point scorers and three different leading scorers in seven games, and Sue Bird and Crystal Langhorne have both scored at least 17 in a game. Friday's game against the Mercury marked the fifth game out of seven in which four Storm players reached double figures.

SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 15th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is ninth in career steals with 553. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 13 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 549 career steals rank fifth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up two spots on the all-time list this year.

Crystal Langhorne sits in fourth all-time on the WNBA's FG% charts. A career 55.9% shooter, Langhorne has led the Storm in scoring since joining the team and in consecutive seasons (2014, 2015).

CRYSTAL CLEAR

Crystal Langhorne shot 8-for-8 from the field on her way to a season-high 18 points in Saturday's win over the Sun, setting a franchise record for field goals without a miss. Langhorne had a game-high eight rebounds and the second-most points in the game, and her 18 points featured her seventh career three-pointer and first since 2014. While going 8-for-8 is certainly an outlier, Langhorne is no stranger to being the most efficient player on the floor. Her career average of 55.9 percent shooting ranks fourth in WNBA history, and she's been in the league's top five in that category every year since joining Seattle.

MULTI-30+ GAMES IN A SINGLE SEASON

Eight games into 2016, Jewell Loyd has put up 30+ points in a single game twice. Three-time MVP Lauren Jackson is the only other player in a Storm jersey to accomplish this feat, which she has done in 6 seasons (2003, 2004, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010). Jackson's single-season best was in 2007, when she passed the mark 9 times, including her 47-point outburst on July 24, 2007 at Washington in an overtime contest, a then-WNBA single-game scoring record. Jackson would go on to win WNBA MVP honors that season.

TRIPLE-DOUBLE WATCH...

Breanna Stewart nearly became the youngest and fastest player in WNBA history to record a triple-double with her 14-point, 10-rebound, 9-assist effort on 6/3/16 vs. Phoenix. The evening did mark her third double-double of her short career, just seven games in. Should she accomplish the feat, she will join elite company. There have been just five triple-doubles in WNBA history.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 348 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. The 2015 season saw Bird fall just .4 assists per game short of leading the league in the category (Courtney Vandersloot, 5.8 apg, 2015).

PLAYER NOTES

NO LONGER UNDER THE (STORM) RADAR

In a game full of superstars – six United States Olympians and six No. 1 draft picks were on the court when the Storm hosted Minnesota on 5/22/16 – it was Alysha Clark who shined the brightest. After totaling four points in the first two games, the fifth-year forward scored seven in the first quarter en route to a career-high 20 on 7-of-13 shooting. Clark had also scored 20 in a preseason game. On the other end of the court, Clark spent most of the night defending one of the best players in the league (Maya Moore) and held her to a season-low 17 points.

DIETRICK'S DEBUT

Storm rookie point guard Blake Dietrick made her WNBA debut on Wednesday at Indiana, recording four minutes of action in the fourth quarter. After graduating from Princeton in 2015, Dietrick had preseason stints with the Mystics and Sparks, but neither panned out. As a senior at Princeton, she guided the Tigers to a 30-0 regular season and their first NCAA Tournament win. She was chosen as an AP All-American honorable mention after setting the program record for assists in a season. This past winter, Dietrick scored 15.5 points per game for Italian club Orvieto.

TAK-ING THE WNBA BY STORM

Seattle's Jewell Loyd won Rookie of the Year in 2015, but teammate Ramu Tokashiki wasn't too far behind her in terms of statistical dominance compared to other first-year players. Tokashiki was third among rookies in points (8.3 per game), third in blocks (0.9), fourth in minutes (20.6) and second in free throw shooting behind Loyd (86.2 percent). She ranked in the top 20 of the entire WNBA in free throw shooting and overall plus-minus rating. Tokashiki played in 30 games for the Storm, leading the team in scoring four times and posting a team high in blocks 17 times.

TEAM NOTES

FAMILIAR FACES

On Sunday against the New York Liberty, Seattle welcomes back a pair of players that were starters on its 2010 WNBA championship team: Swin Cash and Tanisha Wright. Cash led the Storm with 18 points in the championship-deciding third game of the 2010 WNBA Finals against Atlanta, hitting 3-of-5 from three-point range. Cash and Wright both started all 34 regular-season games that year, with Cash posting averages of 13.8 points and 6.0 rebounds and Wright averaging 9.2 rebounds and 4.5 assists.

#ROADTORIO

On Wednesday, April 27, the USA Women's Basketball Team 12-athlete roster for the 2016 Olympics was named. Sue Bird was named to her fourth Olympic team, going for her fourth Gold medal. Storm rookie Breanna Stewart was also named to the team. This is the first time in Storm history that the active roster had two members on an Olympic roster. Stewart and Bird won a gold medal together at the 2014 FIBA World Championships.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

Seattle owned the No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft for the second straight year, the second time a WNBA team has selected first back-to-back years. After doing so in 2001 and 2002, the Storm won its first WNBA title within three seasons. Including Lauren Jackson and Sue Bird, seven of the players taken No. 1 overall in the WNBA Draft between 2001 and 2013 have won at least one title. In the NBA, having back-to-back top picks has proven to deliver even quicker success: All three times NBA franchises have chosen first overall in consecutive years since 1965, they made the NBA finals within two seasons (Orlando Magic 1992-93, Houston Rockets 1983-84, Cleveland Cavaliers 2013-14).

STEWART'S STORM

During a historic, unprecedented career at Connecticut, Breanna Stewart won four consecutive national championships and guided the Huskies to a pair of perfect seasons (2013-14 and 2015-16). She was named Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four in all four of her team's title runs and won AP Player of the Year three straight seasons. A four-year starter at Connecticut, Stewart becomes the fifth Husky to be selected with the top pick in the WNBA draft. She finished her college career with a 151-5 record after leading the Huskies in scoring for the past three seasons. During her senior year, Stewart averaged 19.4 points, 8.7 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.4 blocks per game while shooting 57.9 percent from the field and 42.6 percent from the 3-point line. Stewart is the only player in Division I women's basketball history to record 300 blocks and 300 assists in her career. At the 2013 Final Four, she became the first freshman in 26 years to earn the tournament's Most Outstanding Player award. Stewart has also played for the United States National Team, helping the USA win gold at the 2014 FIBA World Championship.

AMONG LEAGUE LEADERS

Seven games into the season, Seattle has several players among the WNBA leaders in the main offensive categories. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart is fourth in the league with 8.9 rebounds per game and tied for fourth with 2.0 blocks per game. Sue Bird is tied for fifth with 5.1 assists per game, while Stewart ranks 10th with 17.6 points per contest and Jewell Loyd ranks third with 20.3 points per game. Stewart and Loyd are first and third in the league in minutes per game with averages of 35.4 and 34.9, respectively. Here is where Stewart ranks among rookies: first in points (17.6), first in rebounds (8.9), second in assists (3.1), fourth in steals (1.3) and first in blocks (2.0).

LIGHTING UP THE SCOREBOARD

On Friday against Phoenix, Seattle had its best offensive outing of the year, recording season highs in points (95), three-pointers (12) and assists (25). The 12 three-pointers were two shy of a franchise record, and the 95 points were Seattle's most since 2012. Four starters reached double figures, while Jewell Loyd and Breanna Stewart had incredible stat lines: Loyd notched a career-high 32 points on 12-of-18 shooting, while Stewart finished just shy of having the franchise's second-ever triple-double with 14 points, 10 rebounds and nine assists. Friday's performance came six days after the Storm had set then-season highs in points (93) and assists (16) in a win over Connecticut. All five starters reached double figures against the Sun, when the Storm put up 31 in the third period and 28 in the first, its two highest-scoring quarters of the season.

IT'S RAINING IN SEATTLE

In 2015, 23.8 percent of the shots Seattle took were three-pointers, one of the highest marks in the WNBA. That percentage was even higher during the previous five seasons, when the Storm was always either first or second in the category. This year could be similar, as 10 of the 12 players on Seattle's roster have proven to be threats from three-point range. Through seven games of the 2016 season, 132 of Seattle's 422 (31.3 percent) of Seattle's shots have been three-pointers. The Storm ranks third in the league with 18.9 attempted per game, and fourth with a 34.8 percent conversion rate.

THIRD QUARTER BLUES

Against Minnesota and Washington last month, both the Storm and its opponent started cold from the field in the third quarter. They made just one field goal apiece in the first five minutes of the second half. Seattle shot a combined 25 percent (9-of-36) in the third quarter of those two games. The Storm averaged 13 points in those quarters, while its two opponents averaged 14.5. In its next game vs. Connecticut, the Storm's third quarter was just the opposite: a season-high 31 points on 9-of-13 shooting. Seattle's troubles returned vs. Indiana on Wednesday, when it committed three straight turnovers and had one field goal in the first 4:50 of the third quarter.

BOUCEK BACK FOR YEAR 2

Now in her fifth season as a WNBA head coach and second with the Seattle Storm, Jenny Boucek is tasked with guiding the Storm back to the playoffs for the first time since 2013. The club was 10-24 this past season, finishing four games out of the playoff race. Prior to taking over as head coach in Seattle last year, Boucek held the same role for the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs from 2007-09. She was an assistant coach in Seattle from 2003-05 and 2010-14 – Boucek was around for both of the team's WNBA titles – before being promoted to head coach. The Storm made improvements in a few different areas after Boucek took over, namely on the defensive end. Seattle's opponents scored just 7.1 fast break points per game last season, good for second in the WNBA. The Storm also allowed just 30.5 points in the paint on average, the fourth best mark in the league.

JENNY BOUCEK

On January 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was announced as the head coach of the Seattle Storm, the fourth head coach in the history of the franchise.

Boucek spent four seasons with the Storm under the leadership of Agler, rejoining the Storm in 2010 as the Director of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach prior to the start of the 2014 season.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since its inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-America team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
