SERIES NOTES

- The last time out in San Antonio, Seattle earned a 78-68 win over the Stars at the AT&T Center. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart scored 21 points for the Storm, which snapped a three-game losing streak.
- Stewart shot 7-for-14 from the field on her way to 21 points, while Jewell Loyd (15 points), Crystal Langhorne (12) and Alysha Clark (11) were also in double figures for the Storm. Rookie point guard Moriah Jefferson paced the Stars with 16 points and six assists.
- Earlier this season on 6/14/16 in San Antonio, despite a 19-point, 15-rebound performance from Breanna Stewart, the Seattle Storm fell 77-70 to the San Antonio Stars.
- At the AT&T Center, San Antonio held Seattle to just 32.9 percent shooting, while the Stars connected on a then season-high 45.3 percent of their field goals.

2016 RESULTS VS. SAN ANTONIO

Seattle 78, San Antonio 68 - AT&T Center, San Antonio, TX (7/8/15)

The Seattle Storm earned a 78-68 win over the San Antonio Stars on Friday at the AT&T Center. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart scored 21 points for the Storm (7-12), which snapped a three-game losing streak. Stewart shot 7-for-14 from the field on her way to a game-high 21 points, while Jewell Loyd (15 points), Crystal Langhorne (12) and Alysha Clark (11) were also in double figures for the Storm. Rookie point guard Moriah Jefferson, who played alongside Stewart at UConn, paced the Stars with 16 points and six assists. It was the third road win of the year for Seattle, surpassing the team's total from last season. The Storm evened the season series with the Stars, who will visit Seattle on July 20 in the final meeting between them. Seattle shot 50 percent from the field. Langhorne had six points on 3-for-3 shooting in the opening frame, surpassing her total of four points in the first game at San Antonio. San Antonio tied it up two minutes into the second frame, and the teams went back and forth the remainder of the half. The Stars took their first lead at 28-26 midway through the period, and they kept pace with the Storm thanks to a pair of three-pointers and eight total points in the second quarter from Jefferson. Stewart countered with nine second-quarter points, including four in the final minutes as Seattle closed the half on a 10-0 run to make it 47-38 at the break. Both teams were ice cold in the third quarter, as the Stars outscored Seattle 16-11 and they committed five turnovers apiece. Reserve wing Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis hit two three-pointers in a three-minute span to help the Storm extend its lead at the start of the fourth quarter, and Seattle maintained a sizeable edge the rest of the way. Clark scored seven of her 11 points in the fourth quarter, including a three-pointer that pushed the lead to nine after San Antonio had pulled within six. After scoring a season-high 10 points on Wednesday at New York, Mosqueda-Lewis hit all three of her three-point attempts to lead the Storm bench with nine points Friday. Stars reserves Haley Peters and Kayla Alexander added 15 and 10 points, respectively.

Seattle 70, San Antonio 77 - AT&T Center, San Antonio, Texas (6/14/16)

Despite a 19-point, 15-rebound performance from rookie forward Breanna Stewart, the Seattle Storm lost 77-70 to the San Antonio Stars on Tuesday at the AT&T Center. Trailing by double digits for much of the night, Seattle made it a close game in the fourth quarter, pulling within one point in the final minute on a layup by Jewell Loyd. San Antonio's Moriah Jefferson then split a pair of free throws, but the Stars secured the rebound on her miss and Kayla McBride knocked down a three-pointer with 18.9 seconds remaining. Storm guard Sue Bird missed on the other end, and the Stars hit two more free throws to put the game out of reach. Stewart, who leads the WNBA in rebounding, recorded her fifth double-double of the season but shot just 5-for-18 from the field on Tuesday. Loyd had 17 points and Alysha Clark added 14 for Seattle, while Jefferson led San Antonio with a career-high 19 points on 9-of-14 shooting. Jefferson, the rookie who played alongside Stewart at UConn, made eight of her first nine shots to help the Stars build their early advantage. San Antonio held the Storm (4-7) to just 32.9 percent shooting, while the Stars (2-7) connected on a season-high 45.3 percent of their field goals. Despite Stewart's 15 rebounds, San Antonio won the rebounding battle 45-32 thanks to a career-high 18 boards from Dearica Hamby. The Stars jumped out to a 20-7 lead by making 10 of their first 14 shots, including a 16-2 run after the Storm held a one-point advantage in the opening minutes. Jefferson started 4-of-4 for eight early points to help San Antonio open up a double-digit lead. Stewart scored 10 points in a six-minute span to help Seattle climb back into the game during the second quarter. Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis provided a spark off the bench with five points in the period, but the Stars maintained a comfortable advantage late in the period. Clark and Loyd both scored nine points in the third quarter, and the Storm used an 8-2 run to pull within six by the end of the period. After recording 20 points on average in her previous two games, Bird didn't score until the final two minutes of the third quarter and finished with seven points on 3-for-10 shooting. McBride scored 18 points and Hamby added 15 for the Stars, who snapped a four-game losing streak.

LAST GAME

Seattle 88, Chicago 91 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (7/17/16)

After overcoming a 25-point deficit to tie the game in the final minute, the Seattle Storm fell 91-88 to the Chicago Sky. Reigning league MVP Elena Delle Donne scored 35 points, including a three-pointer with 0.9 seconds remaining that clinched the road victory for Chicago. Trailing by 22 after the first quarter and by 24 at halftime, the Storm used a dominant third quarter to climb back into the game. Seattle still trailed by 12 with 3:30 to go in the game, but Breanna Stewart and Sue Bird led the furious comeback that saw the Storm tie it up on a Bird three-pointer with 18 seconds to go. Delle Donne hit her winning three-pointer on an isolation play, and she blocked Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis' attempt on the other end as Seattle tried to get another tying shot off. Bird tied a season high with 24 points, including four three-pointers, scoring 10 total points in the fourth quarter. Stewart added 22 points, eight rebounds and six assists, while Jewell Loyd recorded a new career high with 10 assists. Mosqueda-Lewis continued her strong month of July by scoring 12 points off the bench for the second straight game. Delle Donne and Cheyenne Parker each scored a pair of baskets as part of an 8-2 start for Chicago, and the Sky would only increase its advantage from there. Courtney Vandersloot came off the bench and hit a trio of three-pointers as part of the Sky's 6-for-8 start from behind the arc. Chicago's lead was 36-14 after the first quarter. The Storm was getting open looks but not able to convert them, including an 0-for-4 start by Stewart. Seattle scored the first five points of the second frame to trim the deficit, but Delle Donne would find the touch once again, finishing the period with 19 points on 8-of-11 shooting. Seattle shot just 30.6 percent from the field in the half. Delle Donne drained a three-pointer on the first possession of the second half, but Chicago failed to score for the next four minutes and Seattle went on an 11-0 run to pull within 14. The Storm continued to cut into the lead, using a huge third quarter to make it 70-60 heading into the final frame. Stewart scored 10 of her 22 points, including a pair of three-pointers, as part of Seattle's dominant third quarter.

PREVIOUS GAME

Seattle 80, Washington 51 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (7/15/16)

Led by the 26 points of second-year guard Jewell Loyd, the Seattle Storm earned an 80-51 win over the Washington Mystics on Friday at KeyArena. It was the largest margin of victory this year for the Storm, which improves to 8-13 and evens the season series with Washington. Loyd shot 11-of-17 from the field on the way to 26 points, including 18 in the first half. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart had five assists in the first half, finishing the night with a team-high eight dimes along with 10 points and seven rebounds. Point guard Sue Bird had 12 points and seven assists, while Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis came off the bench to score a season-high 12 points on four three-pointers. It was the eighth 20-point game of the season for Loyd, the reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year. Fellow second-year wing Mosqueda-Lewis has now hit at least two three-pointers in three of her last four games. As a team, the Storm recorded 20 assists, reaching 20 or more helpers for the fourth straight game. Emma Meesseman led the Mystics with a double-double of 16 points on 7-of-11 shooting and 10 rebounds. Loyd kept the Storm in control from there, finishing the quarter with 14 points on 6-of-8 shooting after hitting her first three jump shots. Seattle held a double-digit lead for much of the quarter and led 26-15 at its conclusion. The lead grew to 31-15 after two quick buckets to start the second frame. Washington then used an 8-0 run to climb back into the game, but the Mystics were unable to score in the final 5:28 of the first half. Mosqueda-Lewis nailed a pair of three-pointers, and Loyd continued to impose her will as the Storm took a 41-23 edge into the break. Loyd finished the half with 18 points, while the Mystics' 23 points came on 25.7 percent shooting. Bird scored six of her 12 points in the third quarter to help Seattle continue to increase its advantage. Seattle capped off the third quarter with an alley-oop layup from Stewart to Loyd. The Storm started hot in the fourth quarter, putting the game out of reach as a three-pointer by Mosqueda-Lewis and a Stewart layup extended the advantage to 70-42 in the opening minute.

STEWART CLAIMS BACK-TO-BACK ROOKIE OF THE MONTH

Storm forward Breanna Stewart has been named WNBA Rookie of the Month presented by Samsung for both May and June. In May, Stewart led all rookies in points (17.4 per game), rebounds (8.8) and blocks (2.0) and was second in assists (2.4) in five games. In June, Stewart averaged 19.4 points, 9.5 rebounds and 2.0 blocks per game. She had an incredible four-game stretch, scoring 20-plus points in every contest and averaging 29.2 points on 67.9 percent shooting. Against Atlanta, Stewart scored 38 points, tied for the second most by a WNBA player this season.

JEWELL'S A GEM

When the Seattle Storm and Phoenix Mercury met for the first time this year on May 20, Jewell Loyd scored a career-high 30 points, including the game-winning jumper that gave Seattle an 81-80 victory. On June 3 at KeyArena, Loyd once again posted a new career high against Phoenix, notching 32 points to guide the Storm to a 95-81 win. Loyd, who reached the 500-point milestone on June 3, became the third player in franchise history to score 30 on multiple occasions. It was the most points scored by a Storm player since Lauren Jackson posted 33 in 2010 against Phoenix. Loyd, the reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year finished 12-of-18 from the field and 4-for-7 from three-point range, scoring 19 in the first half alone. It was her fourth 20-point game of the year, and the Notre Dame product also set career highs with nine rebounds and five offensive boards.

WNBA 20@20 UNVEILED

In celebration of the WNBA's landmark 20th season, the league unveiled the 20 greatest and most influential players in its history with its announcement of the WNBA Top 20@20 presented by Verizon. Storm point guard Sue Bird, now in her 15th WNBA season, was honored as one of the 20 players. The list includes nine current players: Bird, Swin Cash, Seimone Augustus, Tamika Catchings, Maya Moore, Candace Parker, Cappie Pondexter, Diana Taurasi and Lindsay Whalen. Storm legend Lauren Jackson is one of 11 former players. The players were selected based on factors like on-court performance and ability, leadership and sportsmanship, as well as contributions to team success.

AND THE ESPY GOES TO...

Storm rookie forward Breanna Stewart was presented with two awards at the 2016 ESPY Awards on July 13 at the Microsoft Theater in Los Angeles. In a clean sweep, Stewart won both of the individual awards she was nominated for, including 'Best Female Athlete.' The 2016 first overall WNBA Draft selection also won 'Best Female Collegiate Athlete.' Along with her former University of Connecticut women's basketball teammates, she was nominated for 'Best Team.' Following her sophomore season in 2014, Stewart won 'Best Female Collegiate Athlete.' She was also honored at the 2012 ESPY Awards after winning Gatorade National Player of the Year as a senior in high school. The Syracuse, New York native has been named the WNBA Rookie of the Month for the months of May and June.

ROOKIE RECORDS RUPTURED

Breanna Stewart scored 38 points, tied for the second most by a WNBA player this season, and the Storm defeated Atlanta 84-81 on Tuesday, June 28 at KeyArena. It was the first career 30-point game for Stewart, who went 12-of-16 from the field en route to the highest-scoring performance by a rookie in franchise history. She surpassed her college career high in points, as the most Stewart scored during her four years at UConn was 37. It ranks as the third-highest scoring output by a rookie in league history and the second-highest point total in franchise history, behind only Lauren Jackson's 47 in an overtime game in 2007.

CRYSTAL CLEAR

Crystal Langhorne shot 8-for-8 from the field on her way to a season-high 18 points in the May 28 win over the Sun, setting a franchise record for field goals without a miss. Langhorne had a game-high eight rebounds and the second-most points in the game, and her 18 points featured her seventh career three-pointer and first since 2014. Langhorne's career average of 56.3 percent shooting ranks fourth in WNBA history, and she's been in the league's top five in that category every year since joining Seattle.

SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 15th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is ninth in career steals with 571. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 13 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 571 career steals rank fifth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up two spots on the all-time list this year.

MULTI-30+ GAMES IN A SINGLE SEASON

In the 2016 season, both Jewell Loyd and Breanna Stewart have put up 30+ points in a single game twice. Three-time MVP Lauren Jackson is the only other player in a Storm jersey to accomplish this feat, which she has done in 6 seasons (2003, 2004, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010). Jackson's single-season best was in 2007, when she passed the mark 9 times, including her 47-point outburst on July 24, 2007 at Washington in an overtime contest, a then-WNBA single-game scoring record. Jackson would go on to win WNBA MVP honors that season.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 255 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. The 2015 season saw Bird fall just .4 assists per game short of leading the league in the category (Courtney Vandersloot, 5.8 apg, 2015).

MIGHT WANT TO GUARD HER

Crystal Langhorne sits in third all-time on the WNBA's FG% charts. A career 56.3% shooter, Langhorne has led the Storm in scoring since joining the team and in consecutive seasons (2014, 2015).

TEAM NOTES

RETIRING #15

On Friday, July 15, when Seattle took on the Washington Mystics, the Storm officially retired the No. 15 of former star center Lauren Jackson. After announcing her retirement in March, Jackson made the trip from Australia to Seattle and was honored in an emotional ceremony after the game. Jackson, a three-time WNBA MVP, is the Storm's all-time leading scorer and rebounder. She played all of her 12 WNBA seasons in Seattle, starting 358 total games and guiding the Storm to championships in 2004 and 2010. Jackson ranks seventh all-time in scoring (6,007 points), ninth in rebounds (2,447) and third in blocks (586). Despite the loss, the Storm recorded a season-high 28 assists as a team against Chicago on July 17 compared to only 12 turnovers. Seattle, which ranks third in the league with 18.6 assists per game, has now reached 20 or more assists for five straight games. Sue Bird, who ranks second all-time in assists, is yet again atop the WNBA leaderboard with 5.8 helpers per game. Against Chicago, Seattle was paced by the career-high 10 assists of Jewell Loyd.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

Seattle owned the No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft for the second straight year, the second time a WNBA team has selected first back-to-back years. After doing so in 2001 and 2002, the Storm won its first WNBA title within three seasons. Including Lauren Jackson and Sue Bird, seven of the players taken No. 1 overall in the WNBA Draft between 2001 and 2013 have won at least one title. In the NBA, having back-to-back top picks has proven to deliver even quicker success: All three times NBA franchises have chosen first overall in consecutive years since 1965, they made the NBA finals within two seasons (Orlando Magic 1992-93, Houston Rockets 1983-84, Cleveland Cavaliers 2013-14).

TRIPLE-DOUBLE WATCH...

Breanna Stewart nearly became the youngest and fastest player in WNBA history to record a triple-double with her 14-point, 10-rebound, 9-assist effort on 6/3/16 vs. Phoenix. The evening did mark her third double-double of her short career, just seven games in. Should she accomplish the feat, she will join elite company. There have been just seven triple-doubles in WNBA history.

BIRD: WISEST OWL OF THEM ALL

By the numbers, point guard Sue Bird has been even more dominant this year than her previous seasons. Her 12.5 points per game are the two-time champion's most since 2011, while her 5.8 assists per contest are the most since the 2010 title-winning season. Her 1.0 steals per contest represent a personal best since 2011, while her 45.5 percent overall shooting and 43.2 percent from the three-point line are among the highest of her entire career.

PICKING UP THE PACE

In 2015, Crystal Langhorne led the Storm with 11.1 points per game as the team finished 10-24. This season, Seattle has three players averaging 12 or more points per contest (Breanna Stewart – 19.1; Jewell Loyd – 16.1; and Sue Bird – 12.5). As a team, the Storm has also increased its average scoring output from 70.4 points per game in 2015 to 80.3 this year and its field goal percentage from 43.4 to 46.1 percent. Five different players are averaging nine points per game for the first time since 2013.

GUARD THE JEWELL OR JEWELL THE GUARD?

On July 17 against Chicago, Storm guard Jewell Loyd set a new career high with 10 assists, surpassing her previous career high of seven set on June 17. Not a point guard for the majority of her basketball career, Loyd has shown the ability to be a playmaker in her second WNBA season. She's dished out five or more assists on six occasions, increasing her average from 1.9 assists per game last year to 3.0 this season. Loyd has also increased her scoring from 10.7 points per game to 16.1, and her three-point shooting percentage from 20.8 to 30.2.

STEWART'S STORM

During a historic, unprecedented career at Connecticut, Breanna Stewart won four consecutive national championships and guided the Huskies to a pair of perfect seasons (2013-14 and 2015-16). She was named Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four in all four of her team's title runs and won AP Player of the Year three straight seasons. A four-year starter at Connecticut, Stewart becomes the fifth Husky to be selected with the top pick in the WNBA draft. She finished her college career with a 151-5 record after leading the Huskies in scoring for the past three seasons. During her senior year, Stewart averaged 19.4 points, 8.7 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.4 blocks per game while shooting 57.9 percent from the field and 42.6 percent from the 3-point line. Stewart is the only player in Division I women's basketball history to record 300 blocks and 300 assists in her career. At the 2013 Final Four, she became the first freshman in 26 years to earn the tournament's Most Outstanding Player award. Stewart has also played for the United States National Team, helping the USA win gold at the 2014 FIBA World Championship.

CLARK TAKES CHARGE

Alysha Clark scored 23 points on 7-of-7 shooting against New York on June 5, marking a new career high for the veteran after she had scored 20 against Minnesota earlier this season. Clark, who returned to the starting lineup after coming off the bench in the previous game due to a knee bruise, went 7-for-8 from the free throw line. In her fifth year with Seattle, Clark is averaging 9.2 points per game on 47.1 percent shooting. She has recorded the first two 20-point outings of her career, and in a five-game stretch, she put up 13.8 points per night on 61.8 percent shooting.

BOSS OF THE BOARDS

On June 5 against New York, Storm rookie Breanna Stewart pulled down a career-high 17 rebounds, toppling the previous franchise rookie record and setting a league-wide single-game high that has since been surpassed by Dallas' Glory Johnson (22). Stewart is now tied for first in the league with 9.5 rebounds per game and has recorded a double-double in eight of her appearances.

#CLUTCH

On June 12 at Indiana, Jewell Loyd scored 16 points in the second half and hit the go-ahead free throws with 2.4 seconds left to guide the Storm to a 90-88 win. Loyd was fouled on a shot from the right baseline on the fast break, and she drained both free throws to put Seattle ahead. It was the second time this season that Loyd scored the game-winning points in the final seconds. On May 21, Loyd hit a shot with 2.9 seconds remaining to give Seattle an 81-80 win over Phoenix. She scored the final 10 points for Seattle, finishing the fourth quarter with 12 on 6-of-7 field goals.

BIRD TO 700 THREES

In the Storm's game against Indiana on July 10, veteran point guard Sue Bird made her 700th career three-pointer, becoming just the sixth player in league history to reach that mark. Bird currently ranks second among active players with 705 threes made (Diana Taurasi, 875), and her career 38.2 percent shooting from beyond the arc ranks fourth all-time. In her 15th year with the Storm, Bird has been even more efficient at the three-point line than her previous seasons, as her 43.2 percent shooting is the two-time champion's best percentage since 2005.

TEAM NOTES

#ROADTORIO

On Wednesday, April 27, the USA Women's Basketball Team 12-athlete roster for the 2016 Olympics was named. Sue Bird was named to her fourth Olympic team, going for her fourth Gold medal. Storm rookie Breanna Stewart was also named to the team. This is the first time in Storm history that the active roster had two members on an Olympic roster. Stewart and Bird won a gold medal together at the 2014 FIBA World Championships.

MOSQUEDA-LEWIS FOR THREEEEE

Second-year wing Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis has been given significantly more playing time over the last five games, and her three-point shooting off the bench has been a much-needed boost for the Storm. Mosqueda-Lewis is averaging 10.2 points per game on 47.5 percent shooting during the last five outings, including back-to-back games of a season-high 12 points. The No. 3 overall pick in the 2015 WNBA Draft, Mosqueda-Lewis has hit at least two three-pointers in four of those five contests. She's shooting 31.5 percent from three-point range for the season, but 12-of-25 (48 percent) during this impressive five-game stretch. Mosqueda-Lewis came to Seattle last year as the NCAA's all-time leader in three-pointers.

MONEY FROM THE STRIPE

At just 22 years old, Storm guard Jewell Loyd is among the best free-throw shooters in the WNBA. After making both of her attempts at the stripe last game, Loyd is shooting 89.8 percent (79-of-88) this year, the second best percentage out of all players who have attempted as many or more free throws. This comes after a rookie season in which Loyd shot 90.4 percent from the free throw line, second best in the league among those with 100 attempts. Against the Mystics last August, she set a franchise record and WNBA rookie record for most free throws made without a miss (14).

AMONG LEAGUE LEADERS

More than halfway into the season, Seattle has several players among the WNBA leaders in the main offensive categories. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart is tied for first in the league with 9.5 rebounds per game and third with 2.0 blocks per game. Sue Bird leads the league with 5.8 assists per game, while Stewart ranks sixth with 19.1 points per game and Jewell Loyd ranks 10th with 16.1. Stewart, Loyd and Bird are all in the top 15 in minutes with averages of more than 31 per game. Here is where Stewart ranks among rookies: first in points (19.1), first in rebounds (9.5), second in assists (3.7), first in blocks (2.0) and second in steals (1.3). She has twice been named WNBA Rookie of the Month.

WELCOME *BACK* TO SEATTLE

During the weekend of June 25-26, the Storm completed a pair of transactions that saw guard Noelle Quinn and center Krystal Thomas return to the team's roster. In a trade for Quinn, Seattle sent the rights to Angel Robinson to Phoenix. Robinson appeared in 25 games in 2014, her only season in Seattle. Quinn played for the Storm during the 2013 and 2014 seasons before signing with Phoenix prior to the 2015 campaign. Thomas, signed as a free agent after being released by the Storm in May, was drafted by Seattle in the third round (36th overall) of the 2011 WNBA Draft. In separate moves, Seattle waived guard Blake Dietrick and center Markeisha Gatling. Quinn and Thomas made their first appearances of the season for Seattle in the June 28 victory over Atlanta.

BOUCEK BACK FOR YEAR 2

Now in her fifth season as a WNBA head coach and second with the Seattle Storm, Jenny Boucek is tasked with guiding the Storm back to the playoffs for the first time since 2013. The club was 10-24 this past season, finishing four games out of the playoff race. Prior to taking over as head coach in Seattle last year, Boucek held the same role for the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs from 2007-09. She was an assistant coach in Seattle from 2003-05 and 2010-14 – Boucek was around for both of the team's WNBA titles – before being promoted to head coach. The Storm made improvements in a few different areas after Boucek took over, namely on the defensive end. Seattle's opponents scored just 7.1 fast break points per game last season, good for second in the WNBA. The Storm also allowed just 30.5 points in the paint on average, the fourth best mark in the league.

IT'S RAINING IN SEATTLE

In 2015, 23.8 percent of the shots Seattle took were three-pointers, one of the highest marks in the WNBA. That percentage was even higher during the previous five seasons, when the Storm was always either first or second in the category. This year has been similar, as 10 of the 12 players on Seattle's roster have proven to be threats from three-point range. Now in the 2016 season, 442 of Seattle's 1,373 (32.2 percent) of Seattle's shots have been three-pointers. The Storm ranks second in the league with 20.1 attempted per game, and sixth with a 34.3 percent conversion rate.

STEWART SETTLING IN

After making less than 30 percent of her shots in a five-game stretch early in June, Storm rookie Breanna Stewart found her touch in the next four outings. The reigning Rookie of the Month scored 20-plus points in all four games, averaging 29.2 points on 67.9 percent shooting. Against the Sun, she tied yet another franchise rookie record by making five shots from beyond the arc. Against Atlanta, she scored 38 points, tied for the second most by a WNBA player this season.

JENNY BOUCEK BIOGRAPHY

JENNY BOUCEK

On January 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was announced as the head coach of the Seattle Storm, the fourth head coach in the history of the franchise.

Boucek spent four seasons with the Storm under the leadership of Agler, rejoining the Storm in 2010 as the Director of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach prior to the start of the 2014 season.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since its inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-America team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
